#### Parental Disapproval Kills Two School Bond Issues

Local parents showed their overwhelming support of the Palos Verdes Unified School District by failing to pass two school bonds proposed during the 1969-70 school year. The February bond would have assisted the intermediate schools and students were told that MHS wouldn't be effected, so the parents simply lost interest.

A unified liberal dress code was put into effect for all three high schools early in the year. Girls enjoyed the freedom of being able to wear pants whenever they desired. Later in the year, District Supt. Dr. Thomas Woods visited MHS and explained to interested students the reasons why a music and drama facility could not be built in the near future, citing lack of funds as the cause.

### Modular Scheduling Broadens Background



It was designed to help the students broaden their knowledge by stimulating them to ask questions and search for their own answers.

"And I always thought a mole was a little hairy creature that burrowed in the ground!" exclaimed many chemistry students when they learned that the scientific definition of a mole is 6 x 1023 atoms. One of the main aspects of the chemistry course was applying the scientific principles to practical situations.

"Dissect a whole cat? You've got to be kidding!" was the general reaction of the Biology 11 class when they found out that they were really going to do it. The adventure turned out to be both fun and exciting. Many other science classes also did interesting labs. They were designed so that the students could observe for themselves what the textbooks taught.




Have you ever seen a brawny football player in an apron or a cute cheerleader in a pair of welding goggles? Such sights were not unusual or discouraged in the applied arts area.

"Results not excuses" was the theme of the Music Department. The results were commendable when the choruses and orchestra presented their Christmas and Spring music concerts.


Madrigals, the new selective group, was started because of the increased number of talented students interested in singing. Several orchestra members formed the spirited Pep Band.




### Boys' PE Aims for Overall Skill Growth




# MHS Shows Proof Of a Green Thumb



### Suzanne Triumphs at Spirit Week Dance















### Service Clubs Make Worthy Contributions


Miraleste's outstanding service clubs, Key Club, Interact and Girls' Service, had an active and worthwhile year.



Two of the most active clubs on campus, Lettermen's Club and Managers' Club, had their foundations in athletics. They contributed service and spirit to MHS.



### Varsity Football Captures 3rd in League






#### JV'S Take Second Place With 4-1 Record




#### Bees and Cees Have Very Successful Year





















Marauder standout was Cees Captain Bob Burns, who led the squad in both scoring and rebounding. Steve Argabright and Brad Perkinson also played consistently well.

















As the season progressed, Mr. Lowery had high hopes for placing second in CIF finals. An increase in players from last year heightened their success.









# Varsity Baseball Team Drowns Sea Kings


