Faculty members attended eight district-wide in-service meetings to coordinate and articulate curriculum. At each meeting, staff compared and shared their goals and methods with teachers from other district secondary and intermediate schools.

Math/Science Department

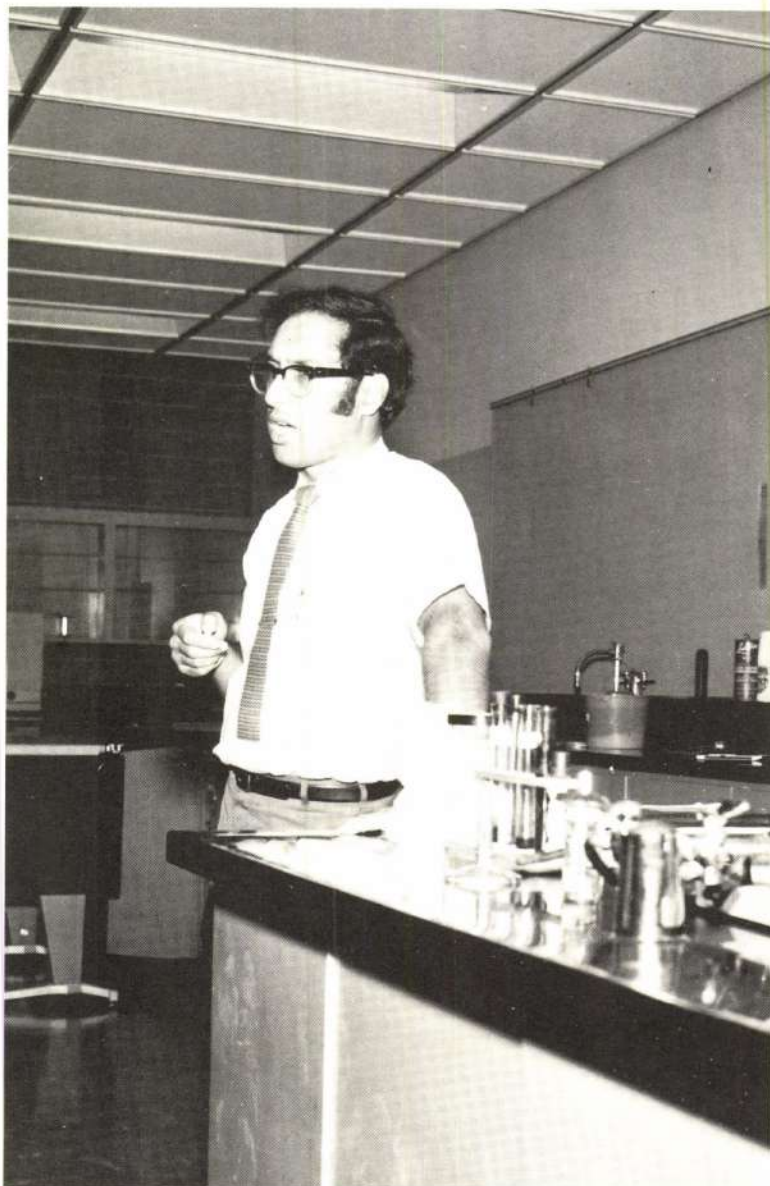

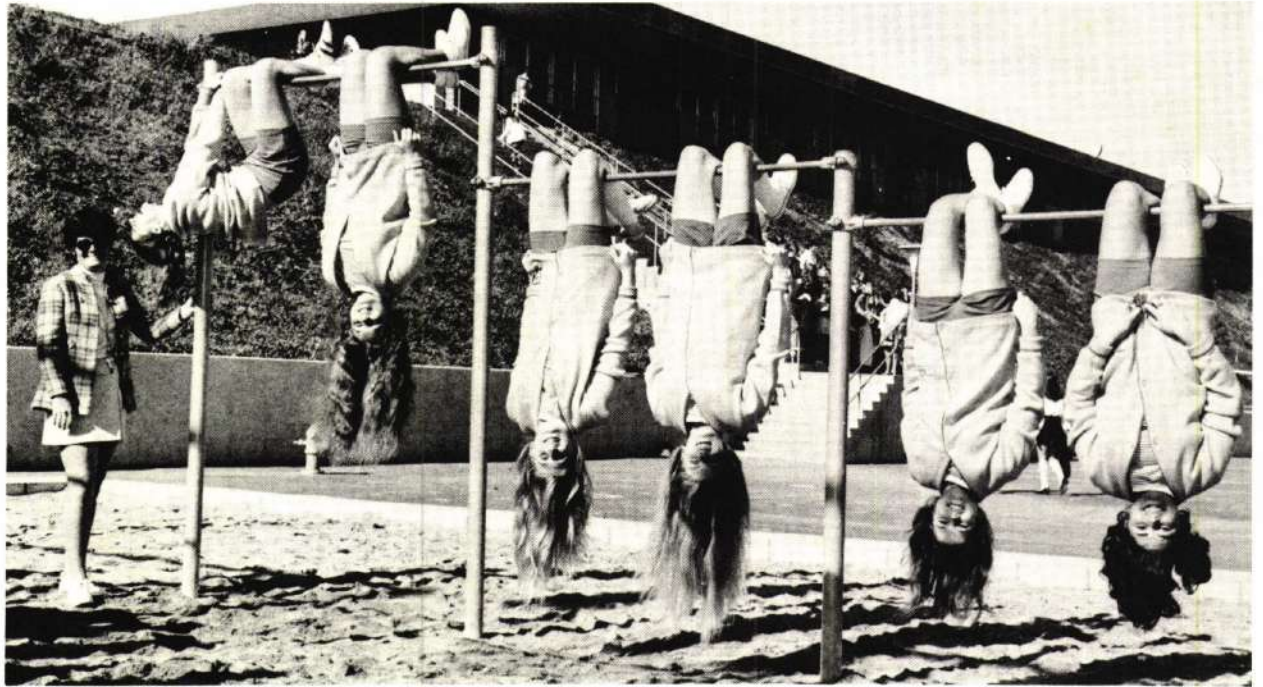

Seniors who could claim membership in California Scholarship Federation for four or more semesters, including one in the senior year, were eligible to be named seal bearers.

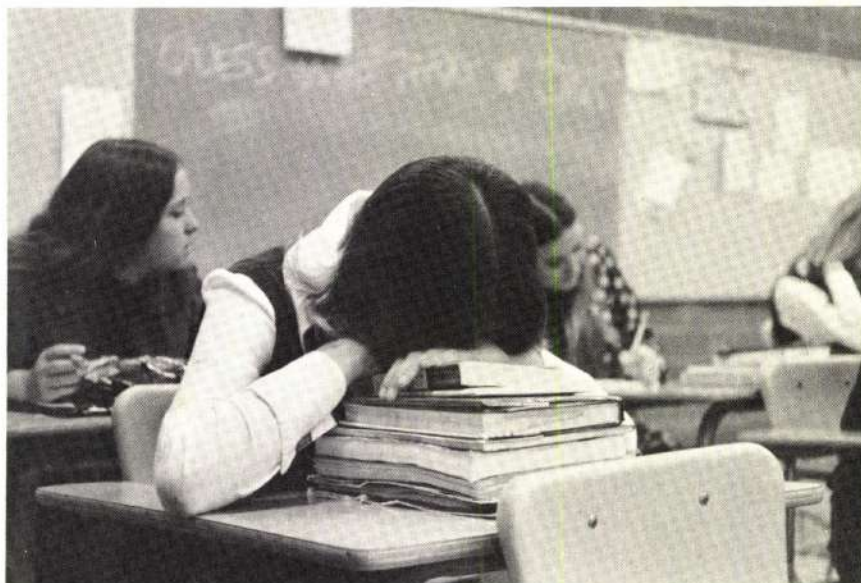
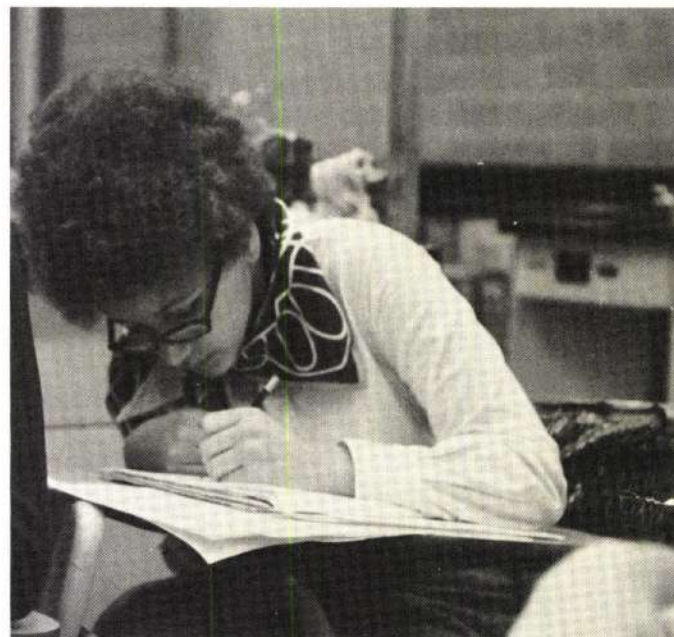
To stimulate enthusiasm, to acquire knowledge, to serve, to promote leadership, and to develop character were the objectives of the MHS National Honor Society.

Members of each group voluntarily tutored students who signed up for help in course work. This was a major project for the year.

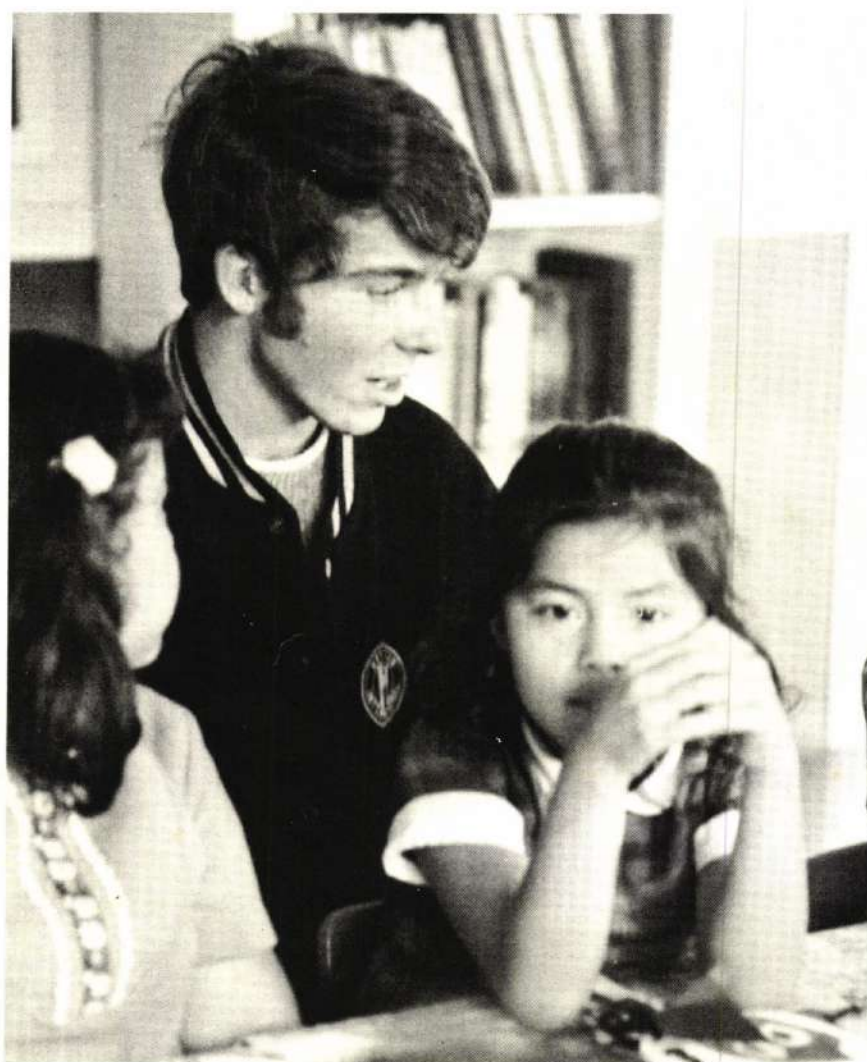

Leagues enliven school spirit

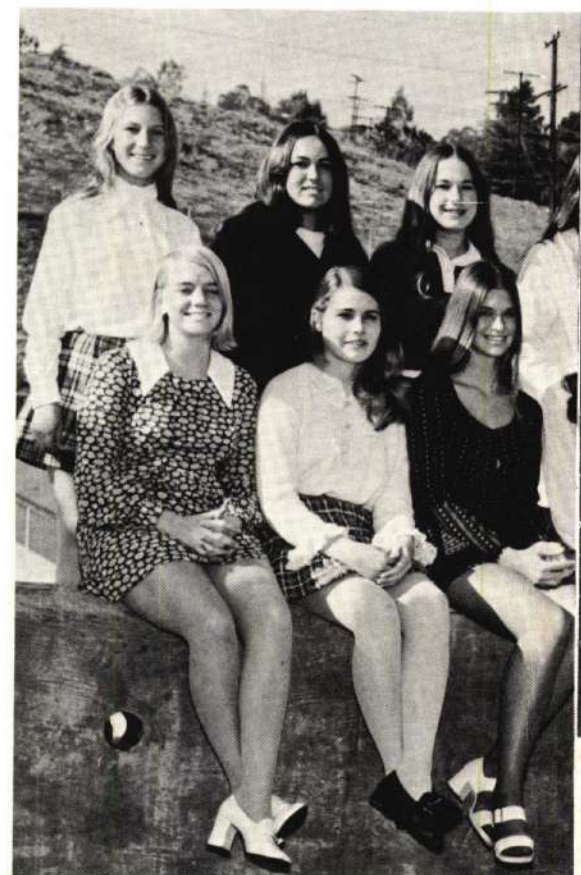

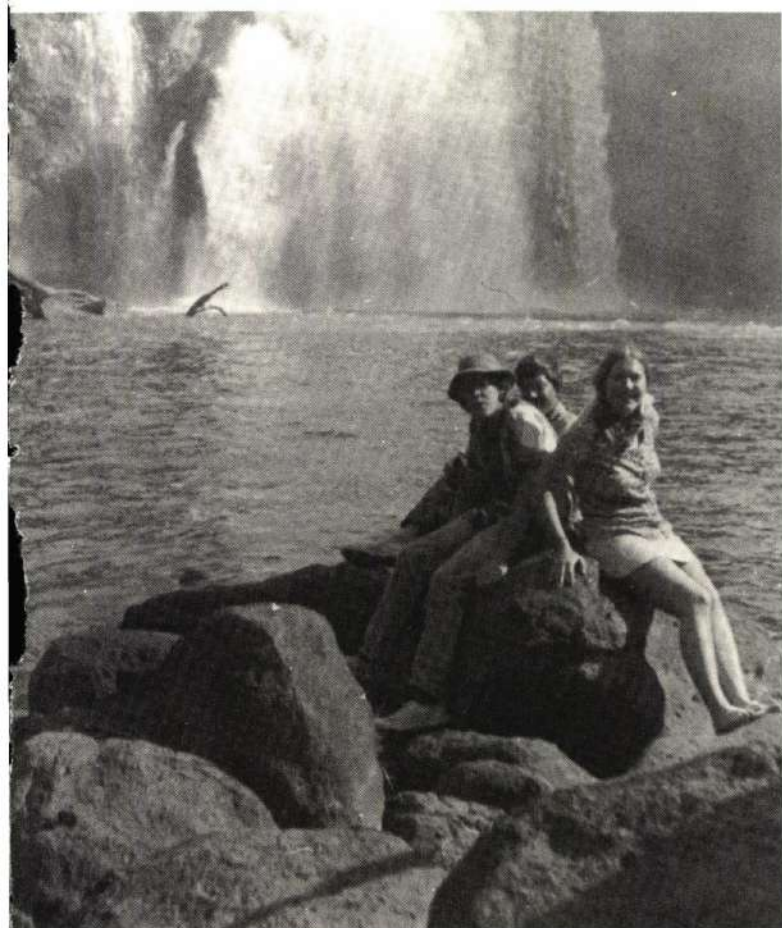

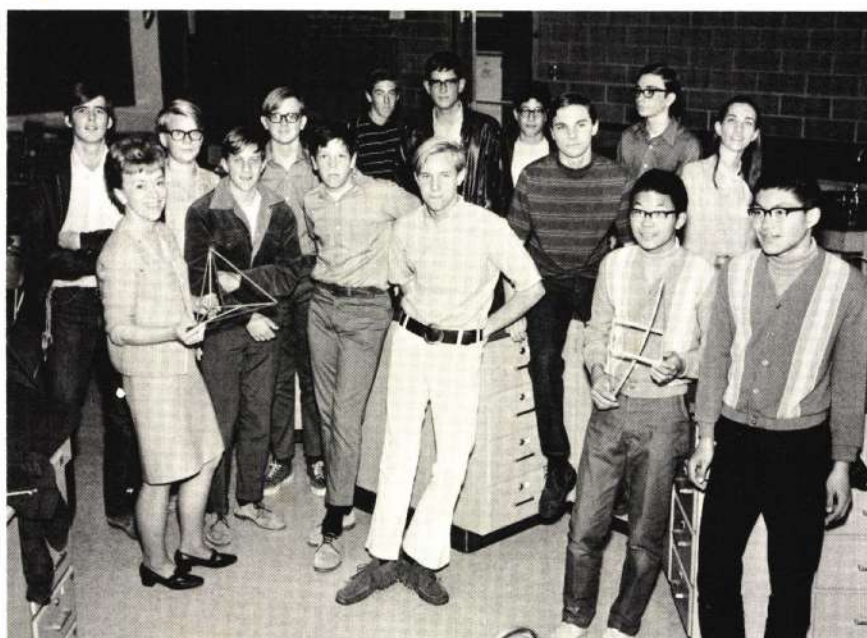

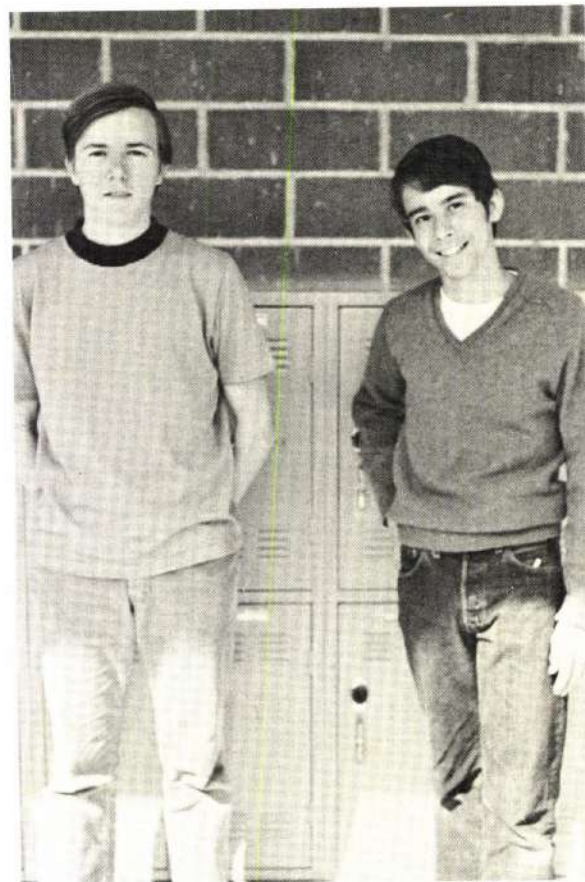

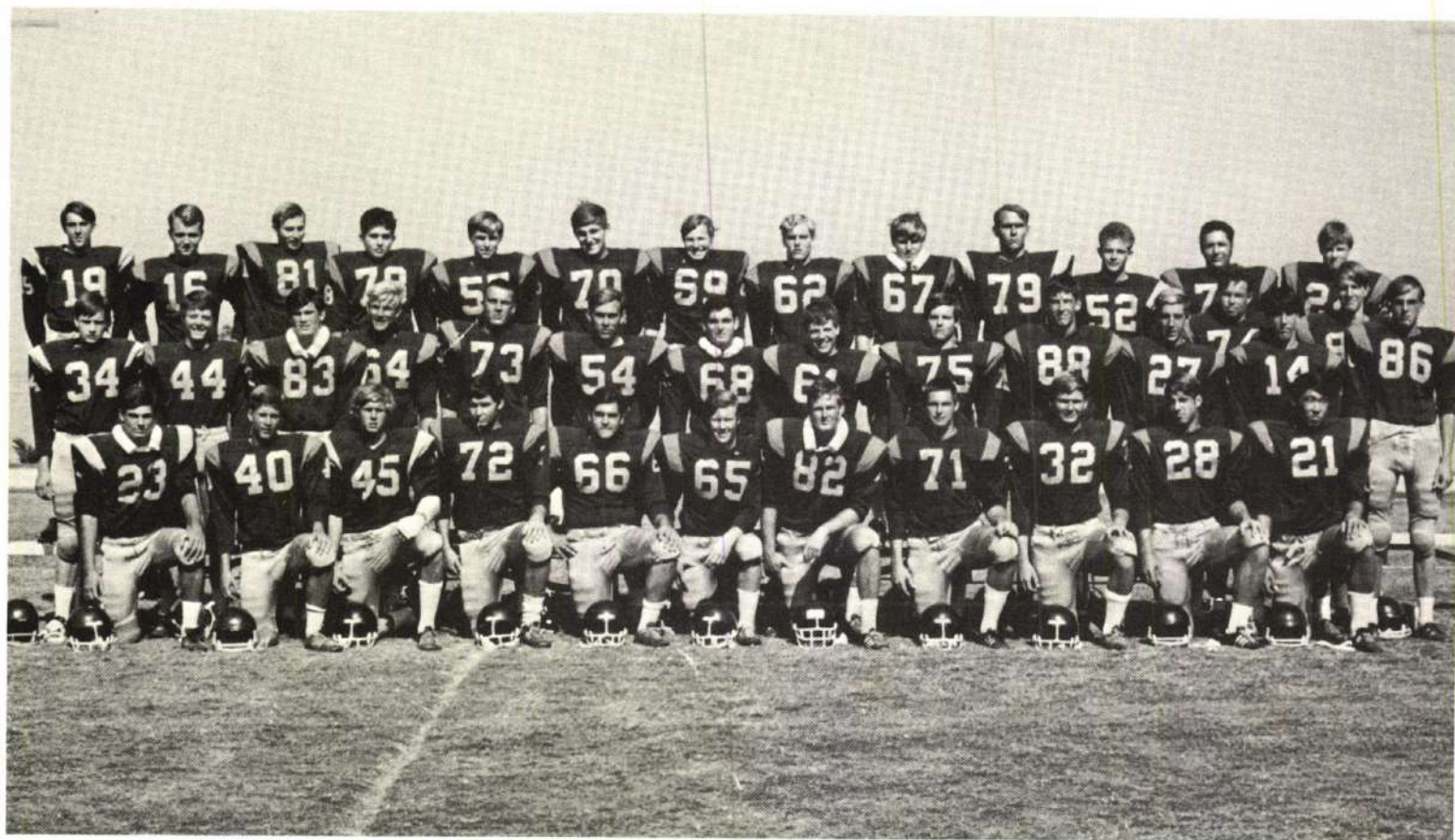

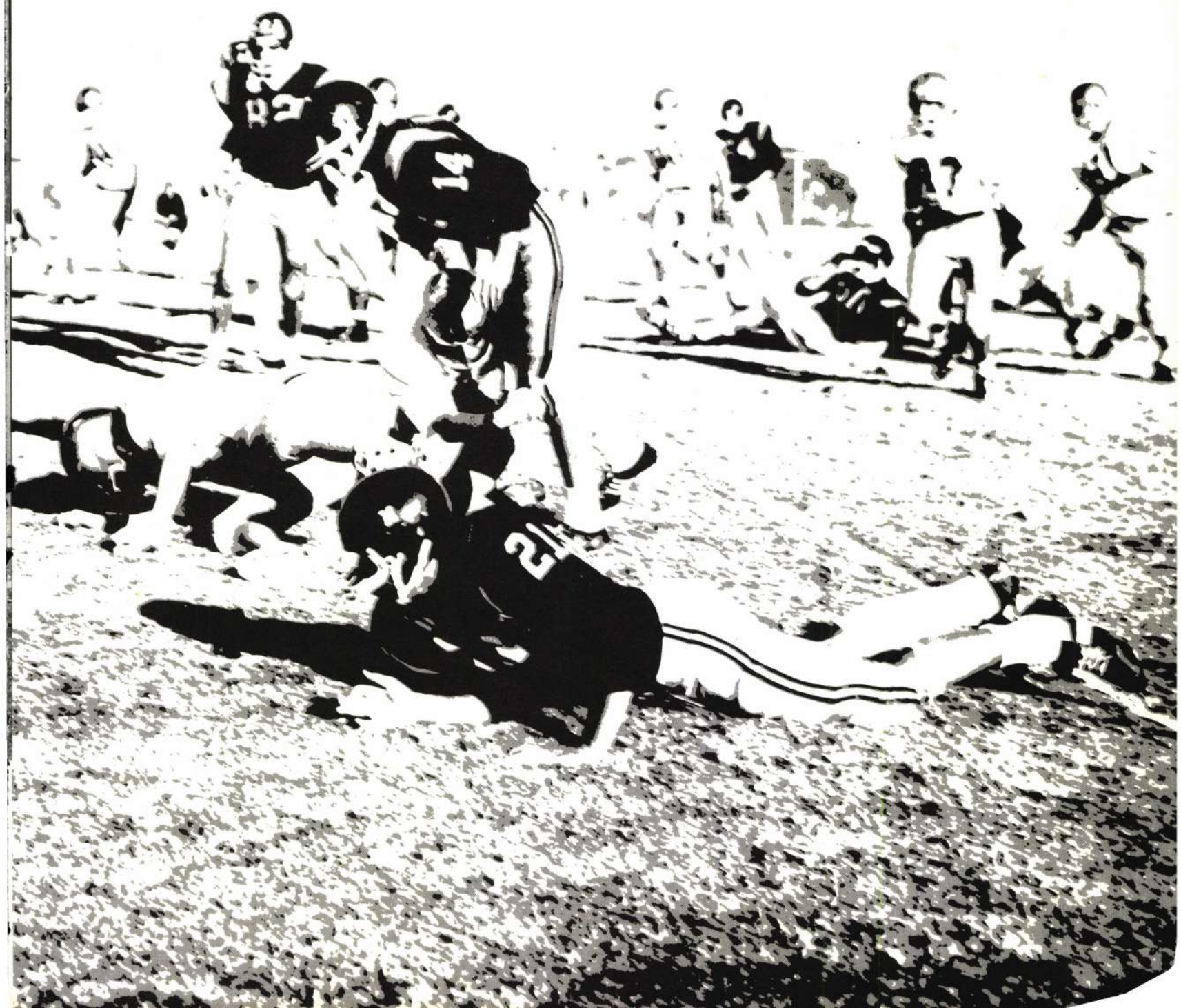

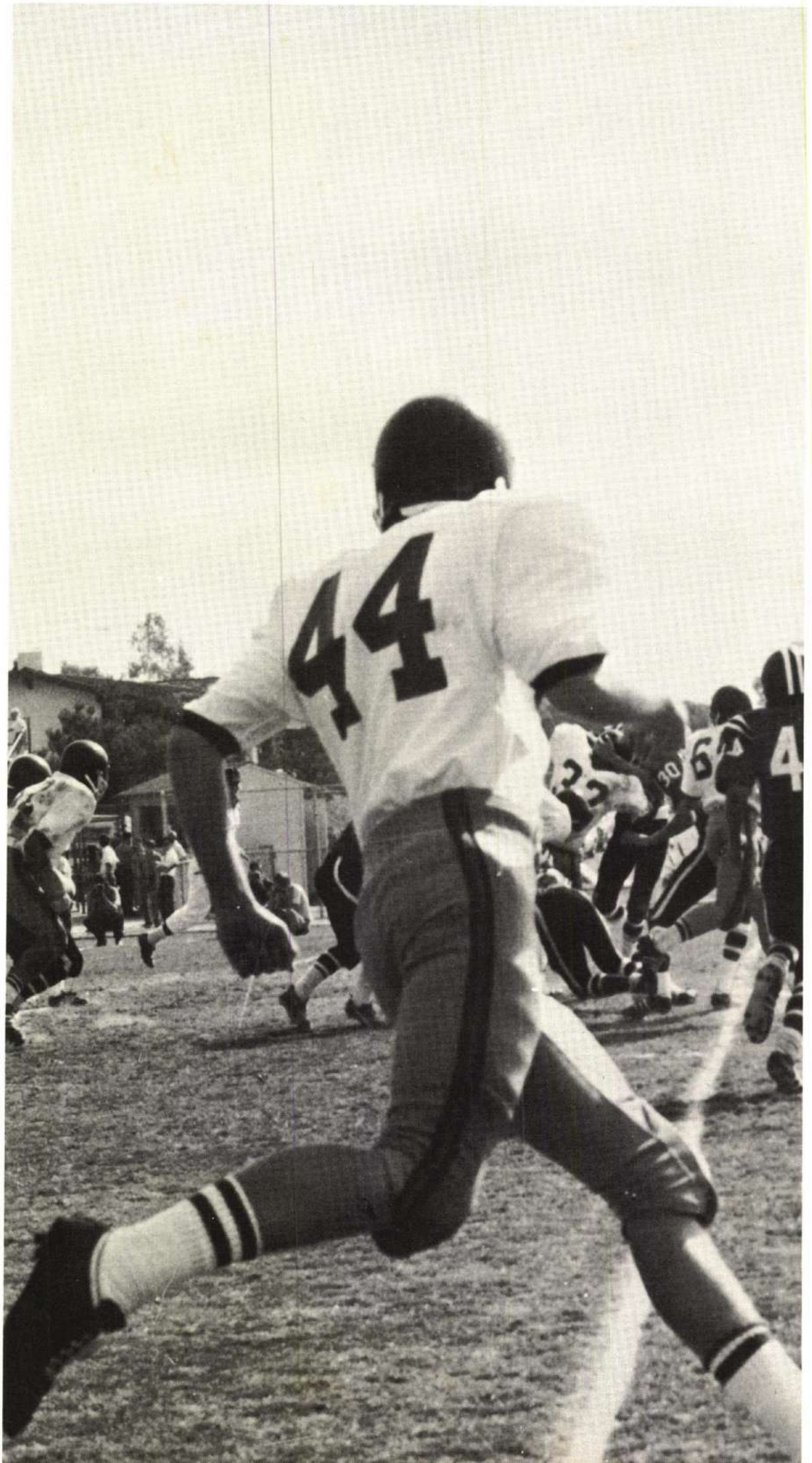

RESERVE RUNNING BACK Matt Tillotson carries the ball against Lennox.



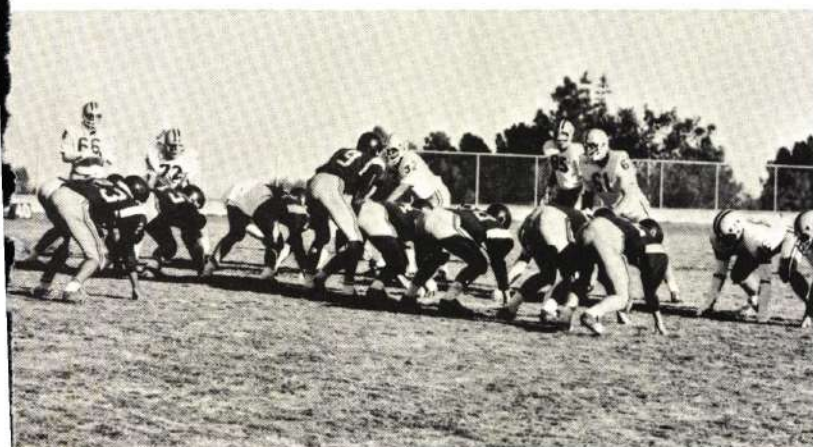

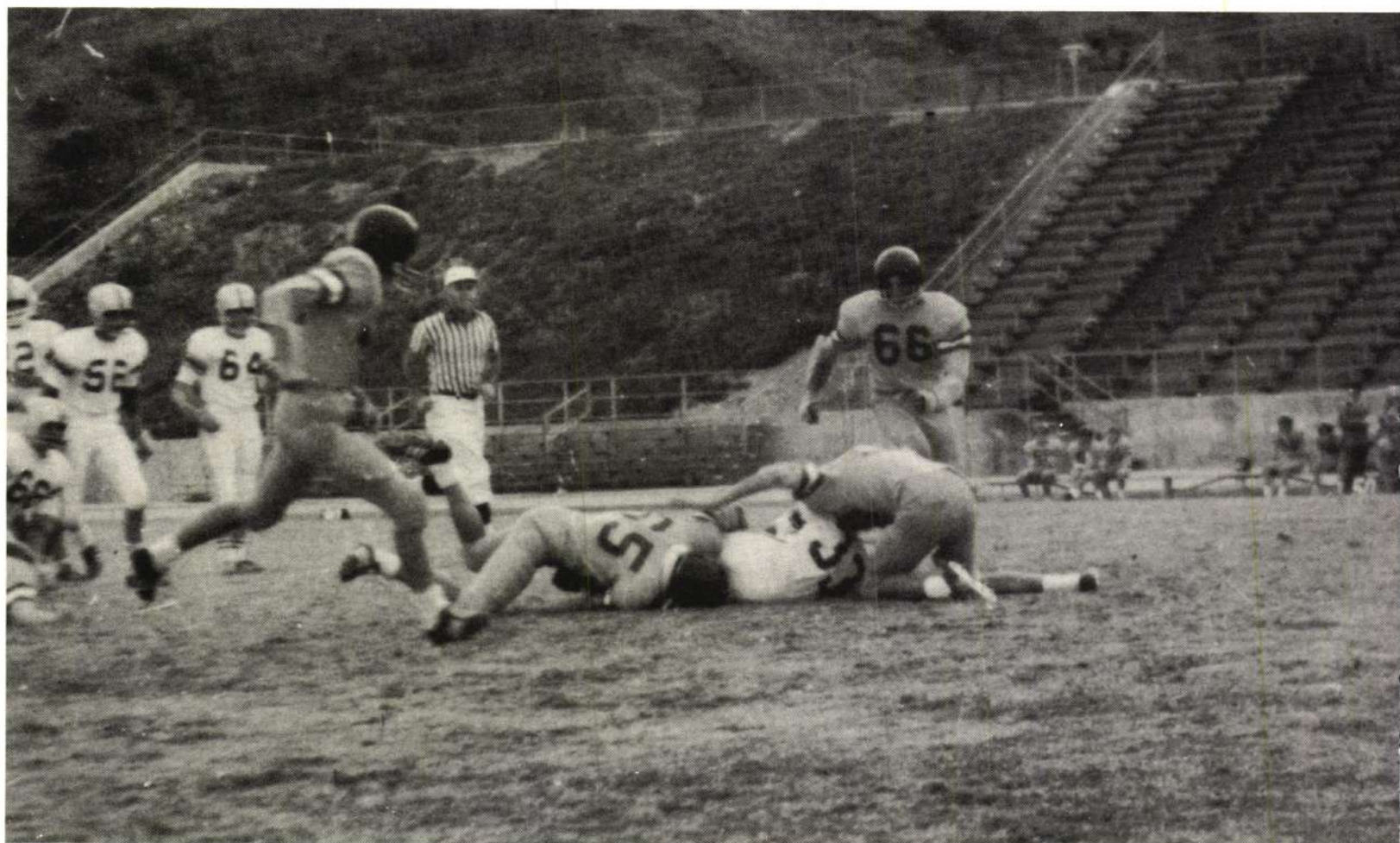

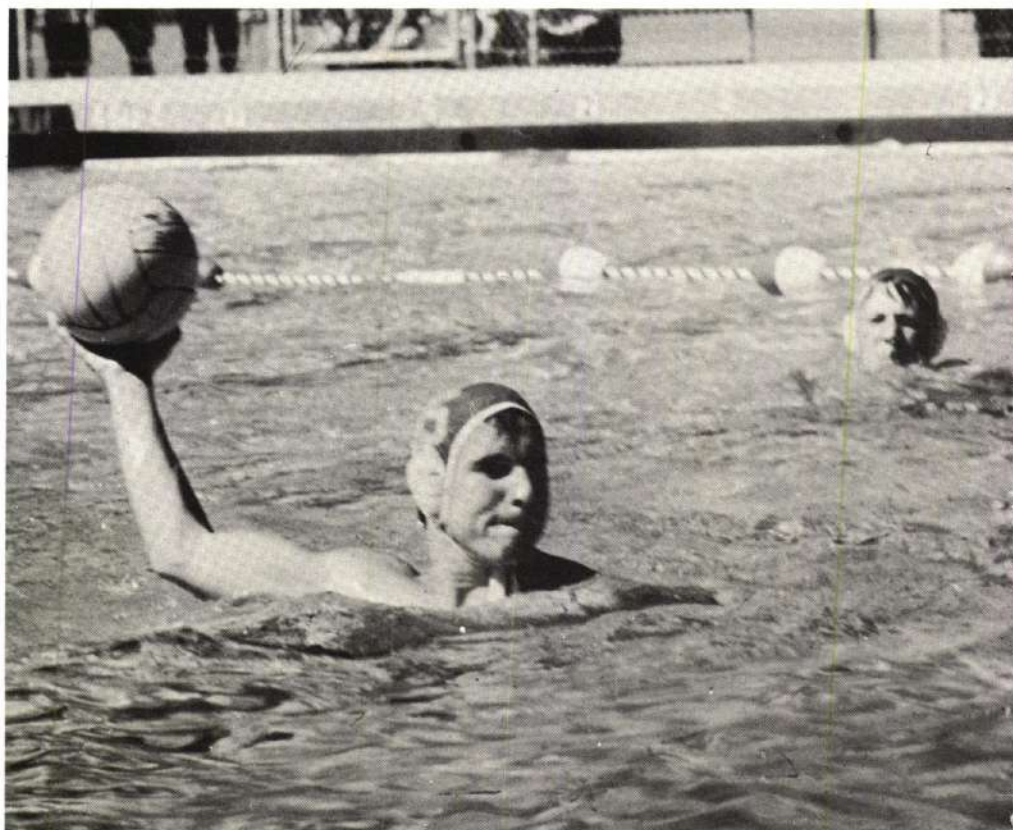

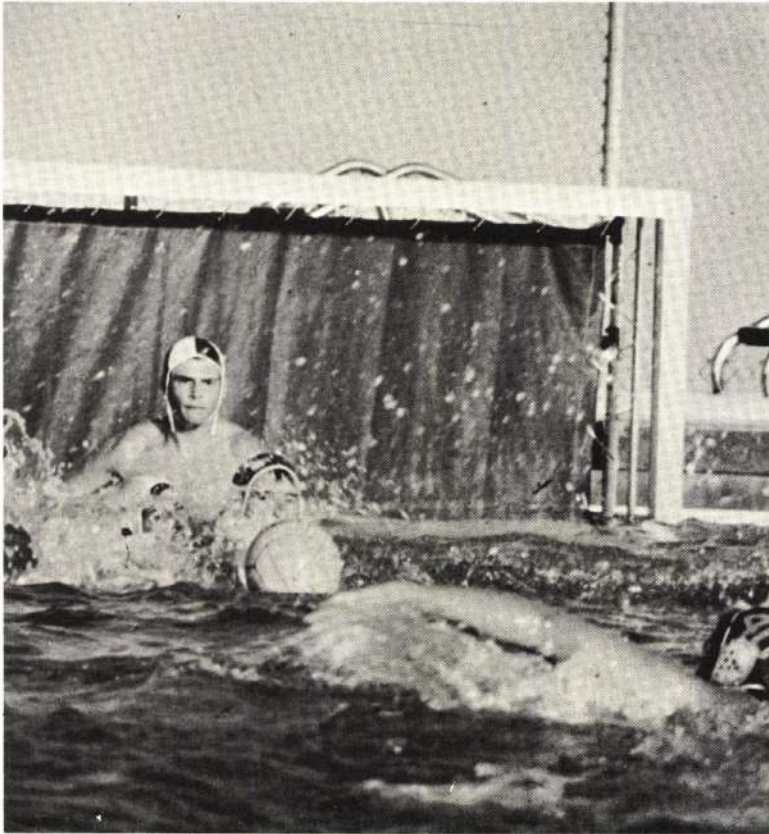

Miraleste High School's 1970 Varsity water polo team rounded out a good season with a nine win-ten loss record.

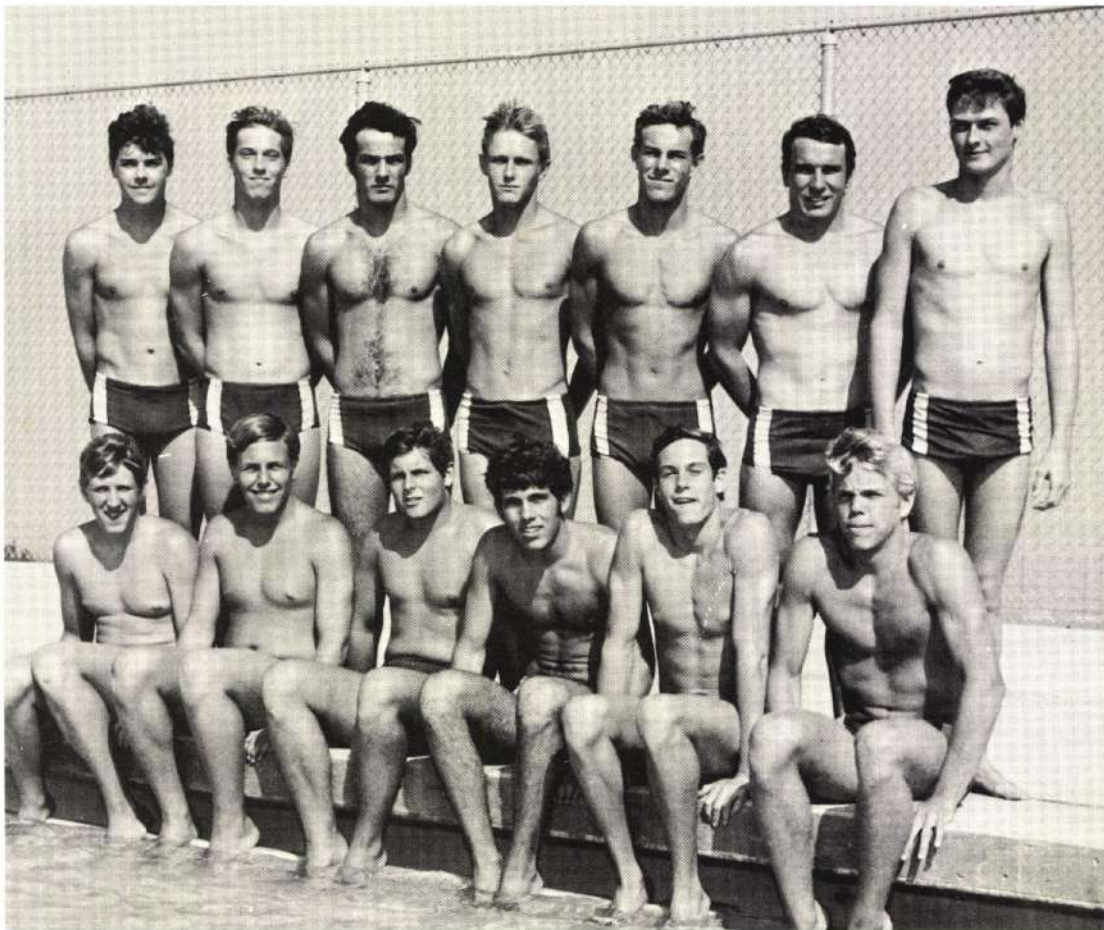
No one was more grateful to have the newly finished MH pool, than the Marauder squad, who were some of the biggest contributors to the pool drive.

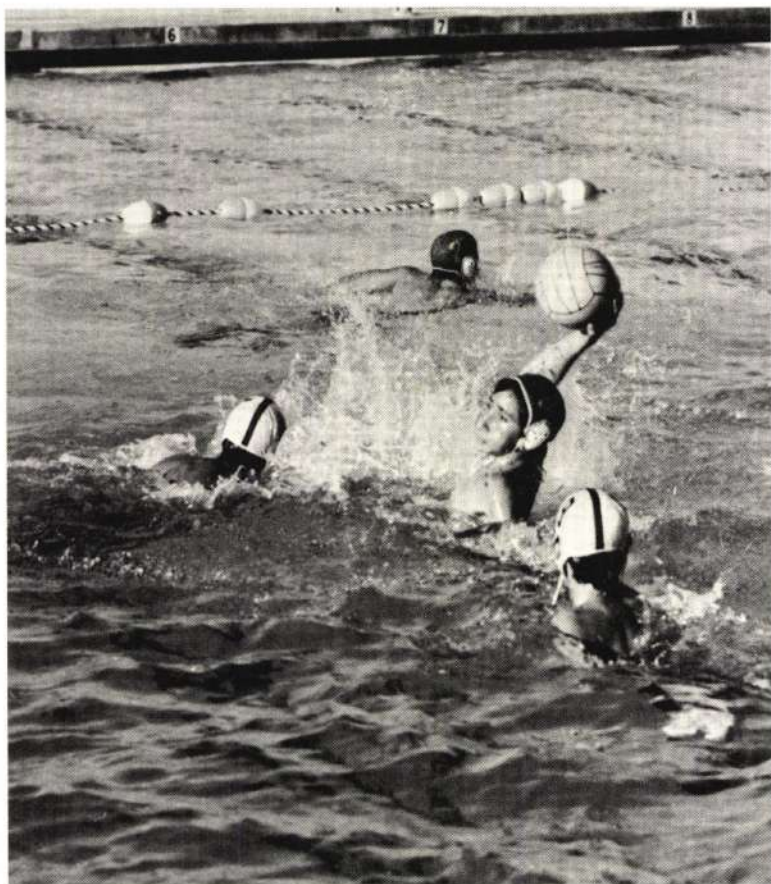

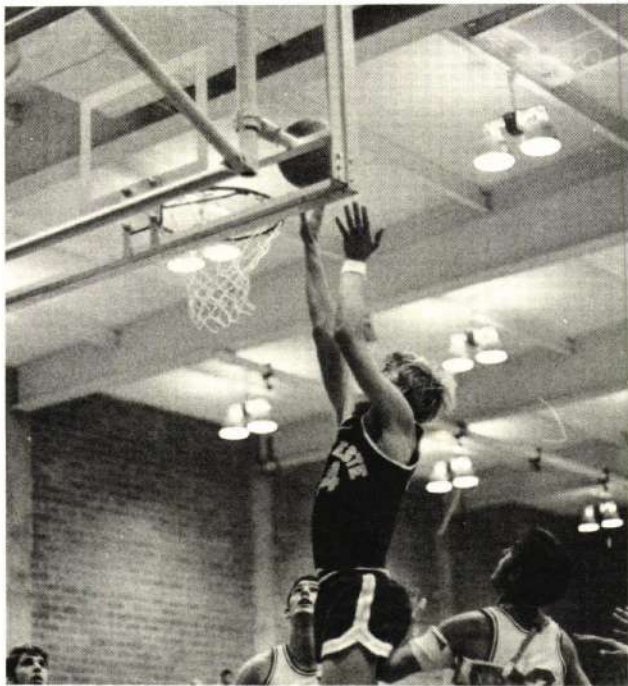

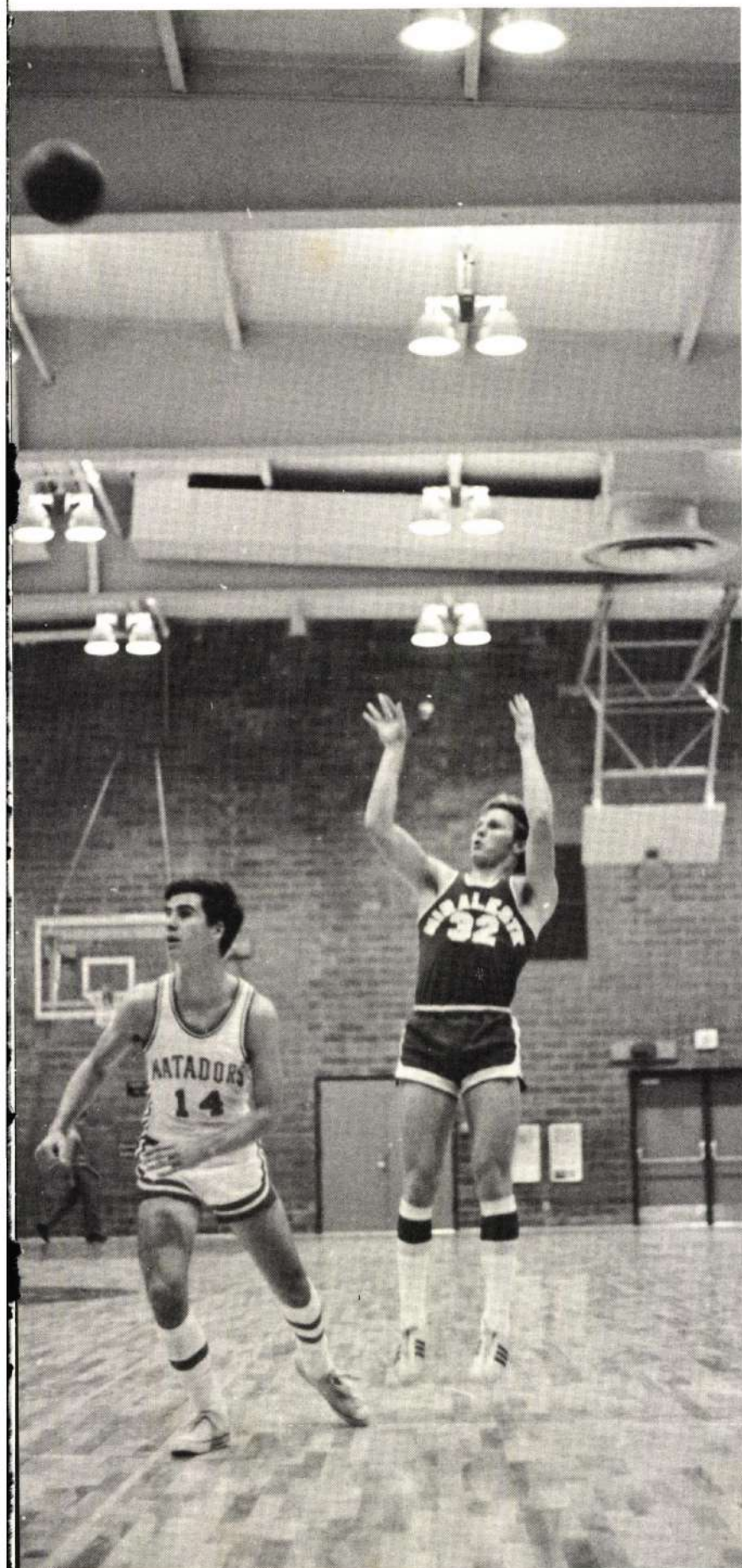
Marauder Cagers reach CIF playoffs

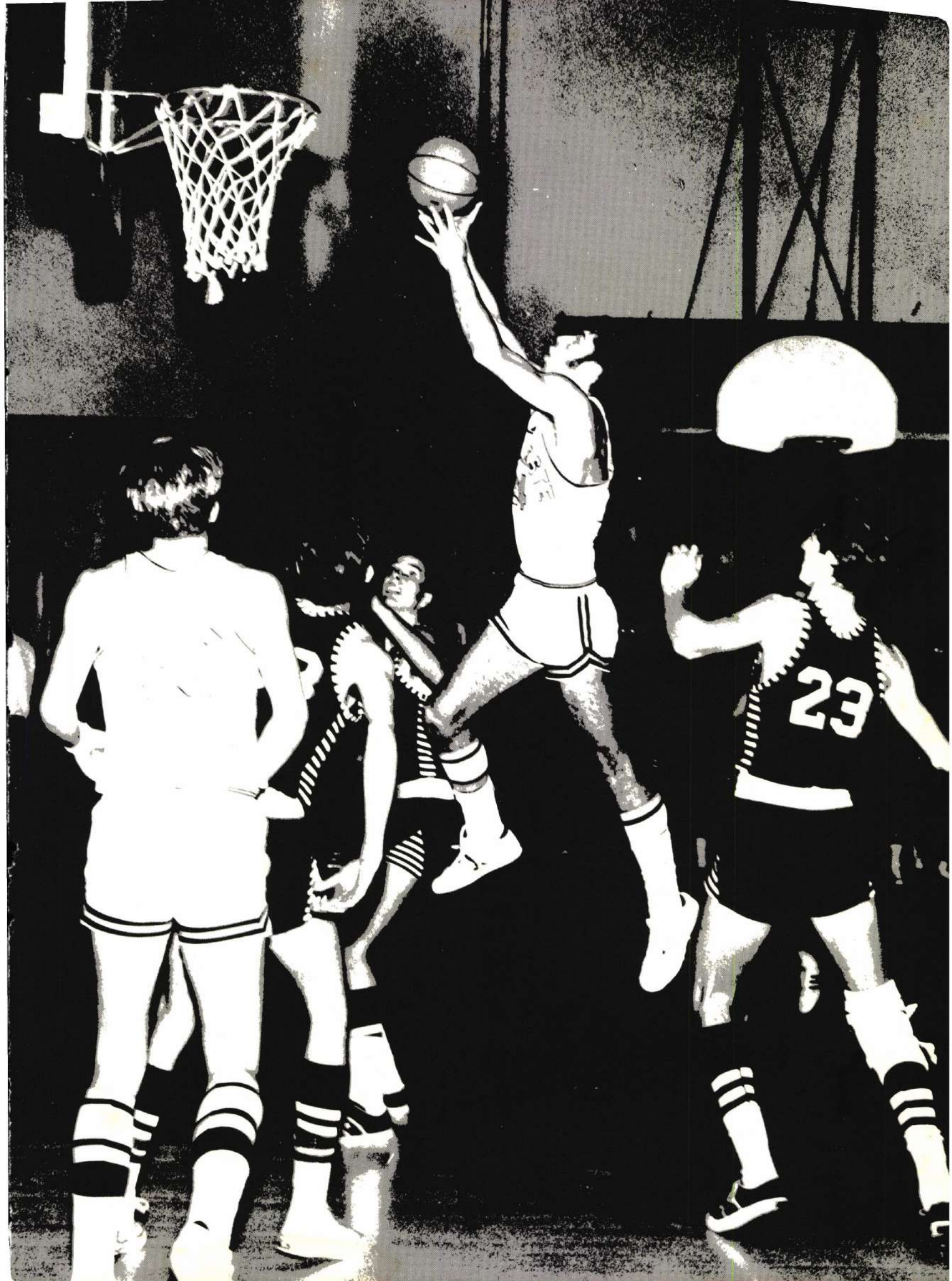

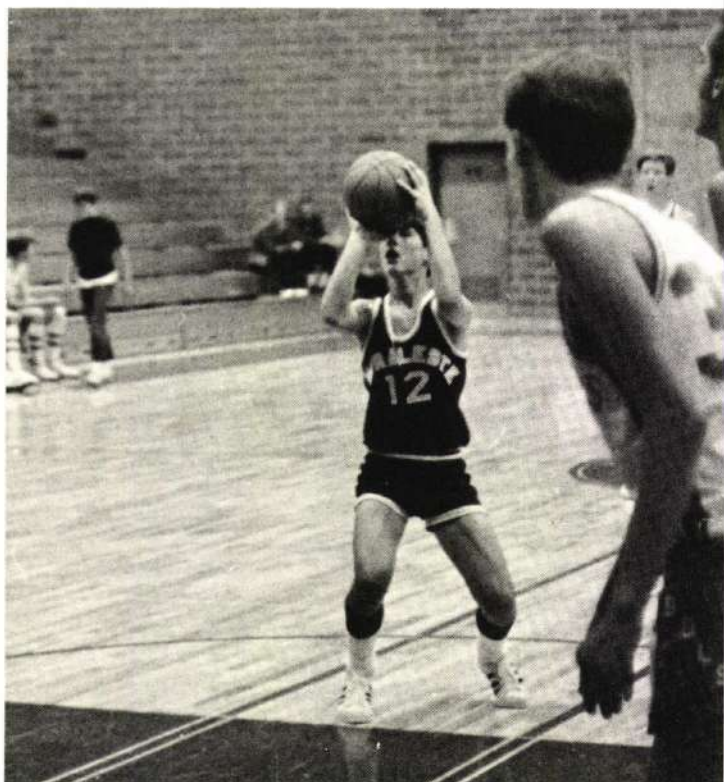


League champion JVs point for the future

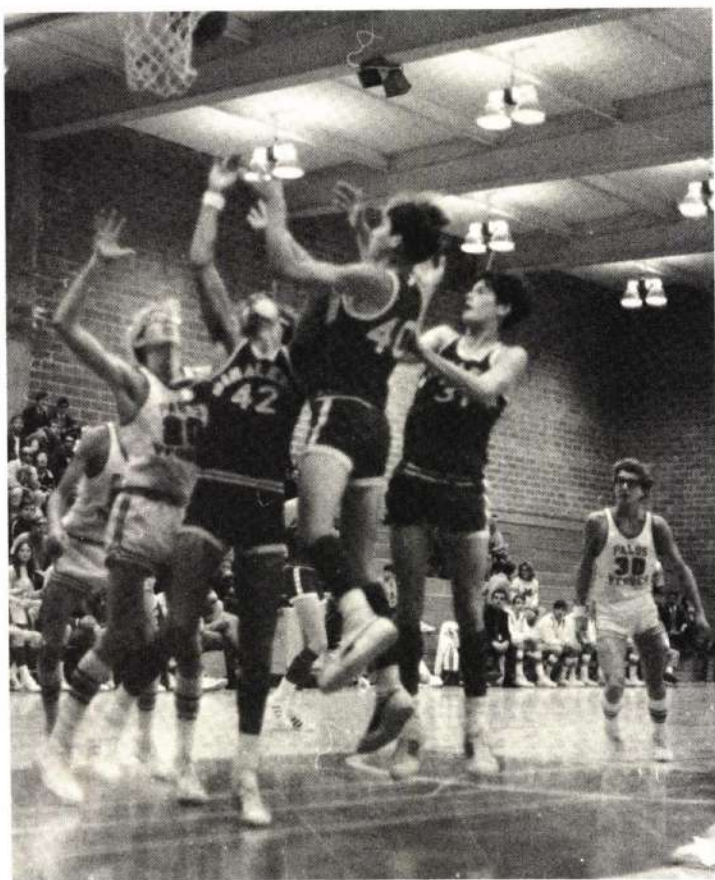

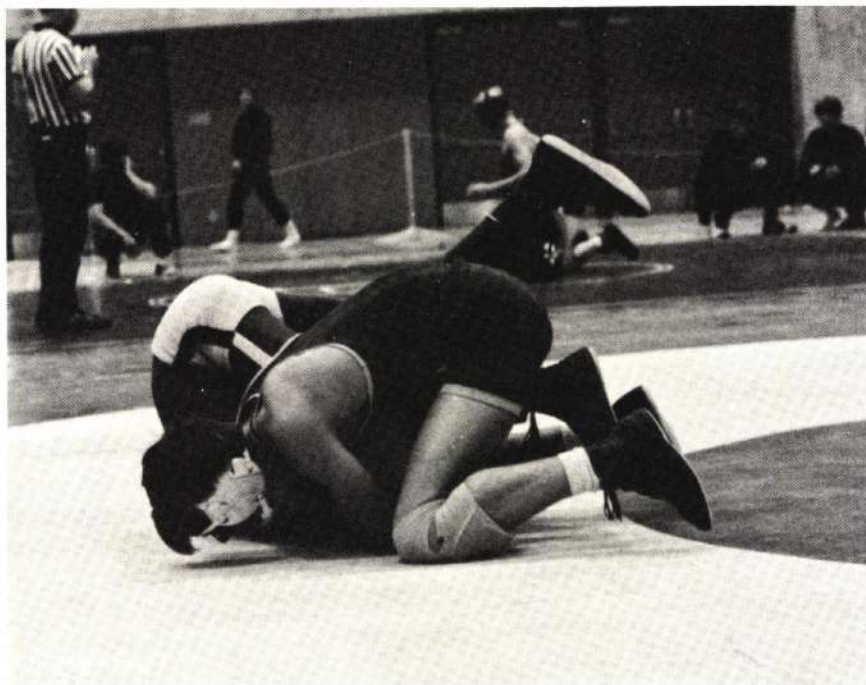

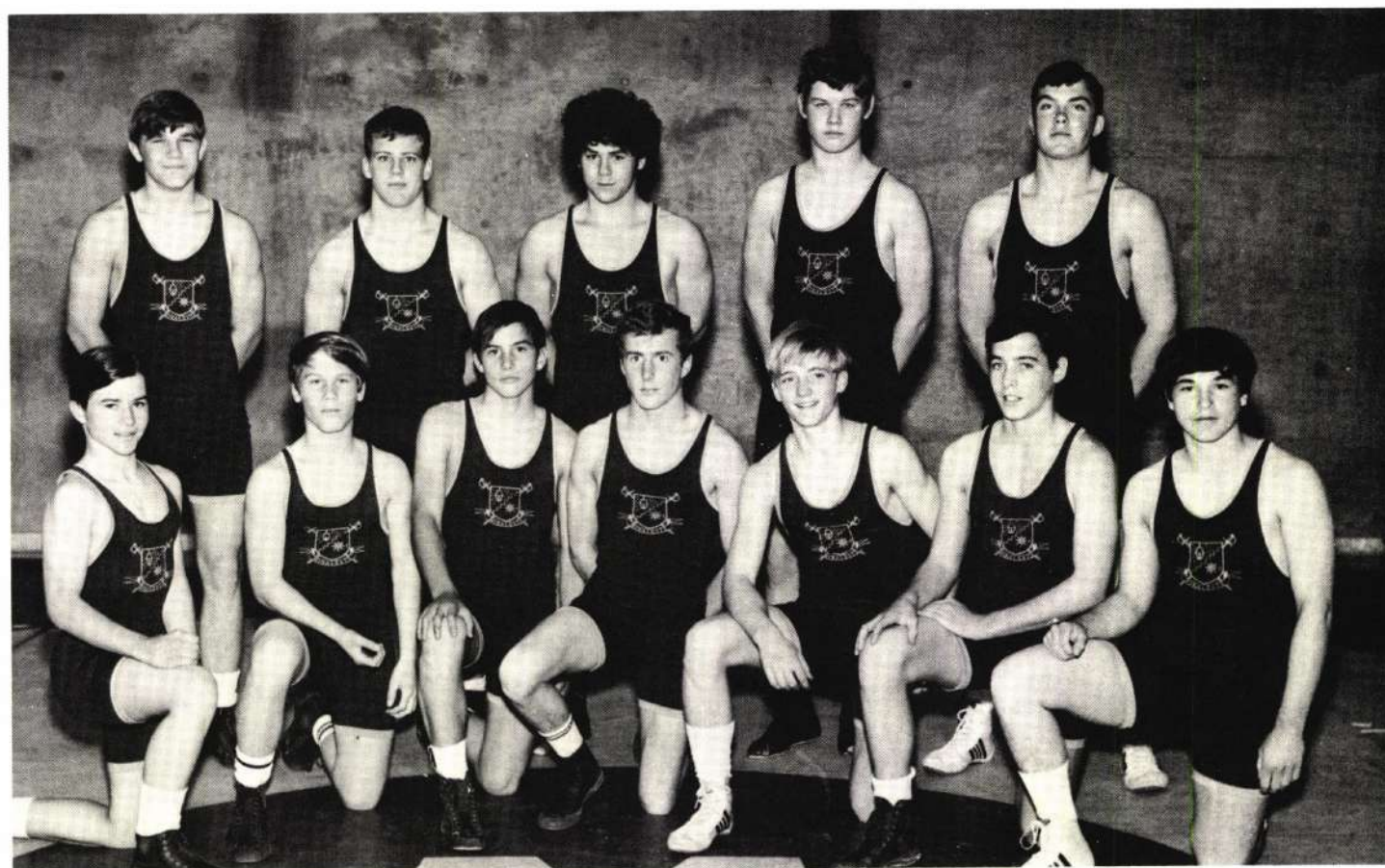

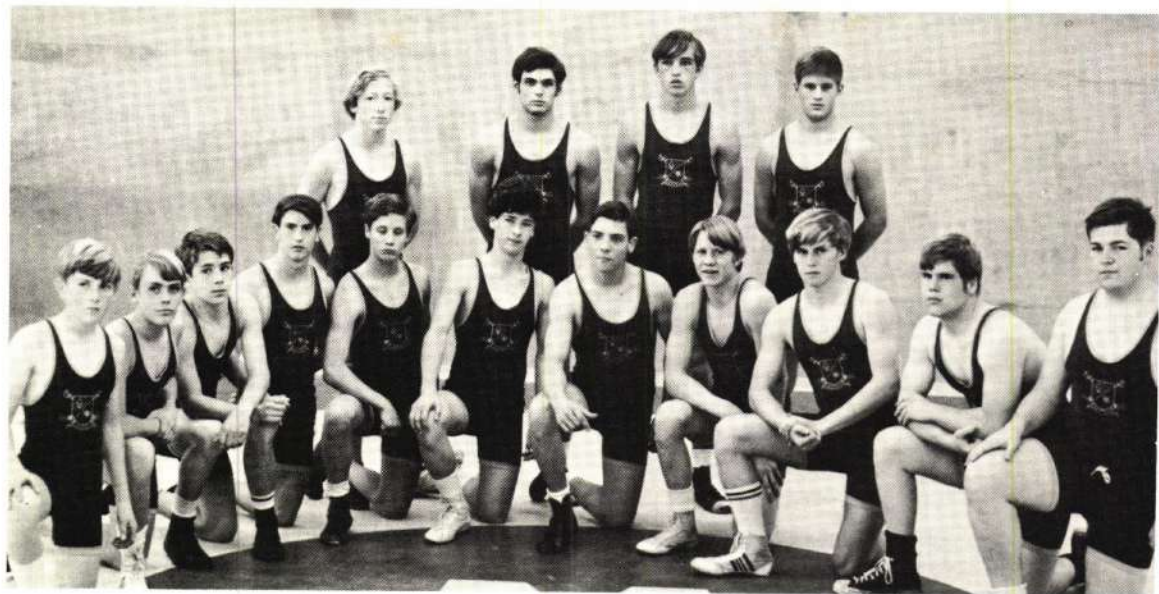

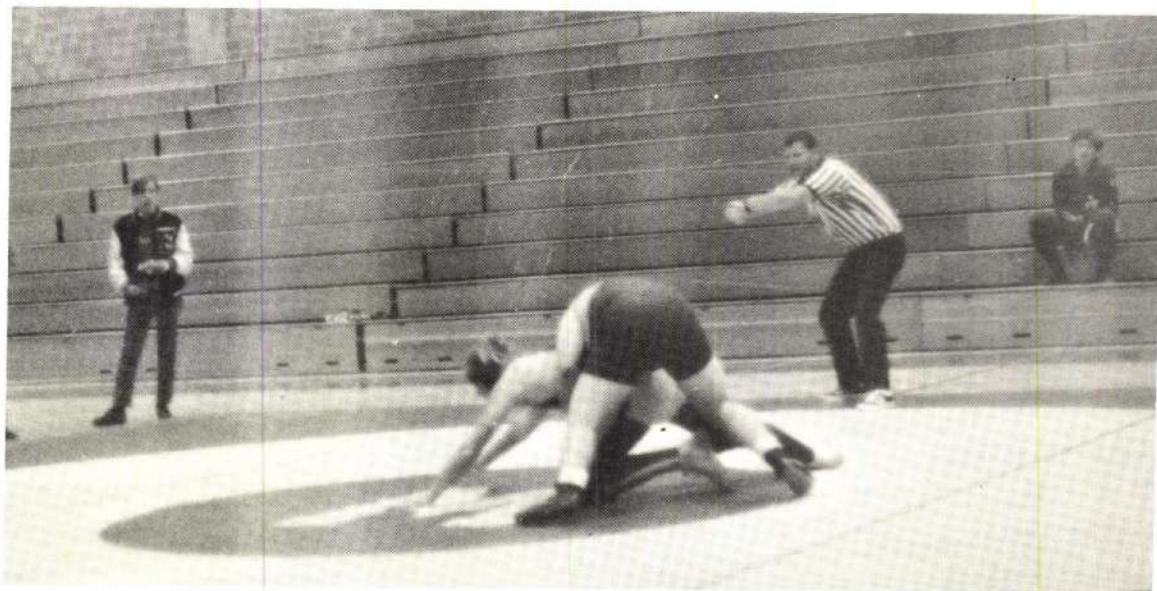

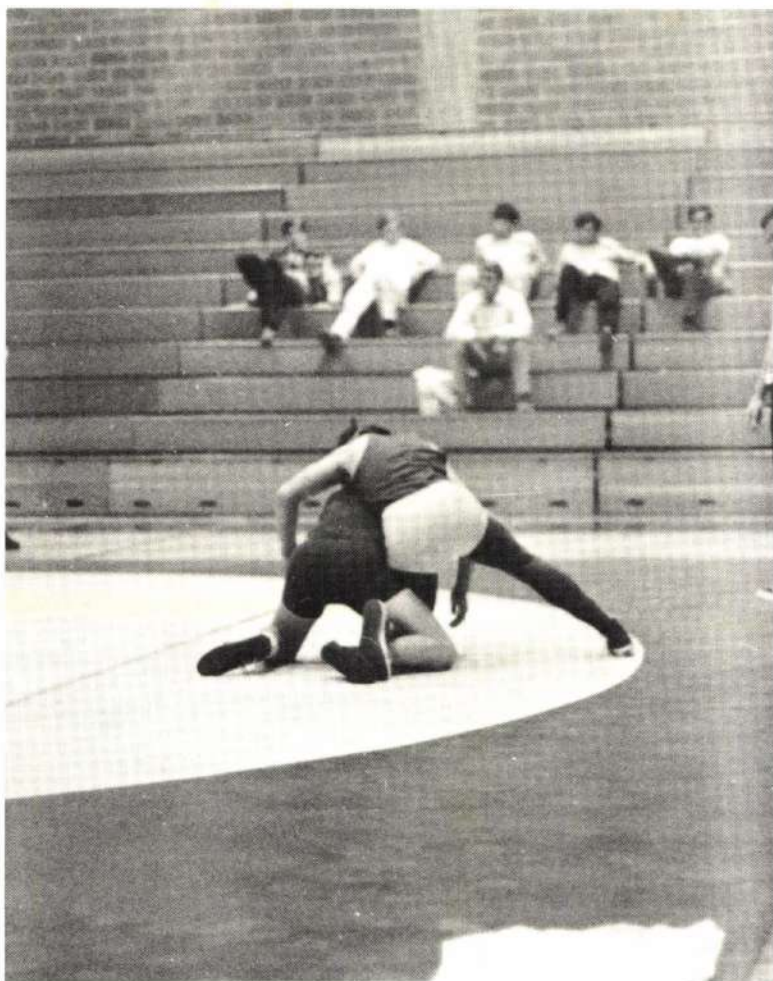

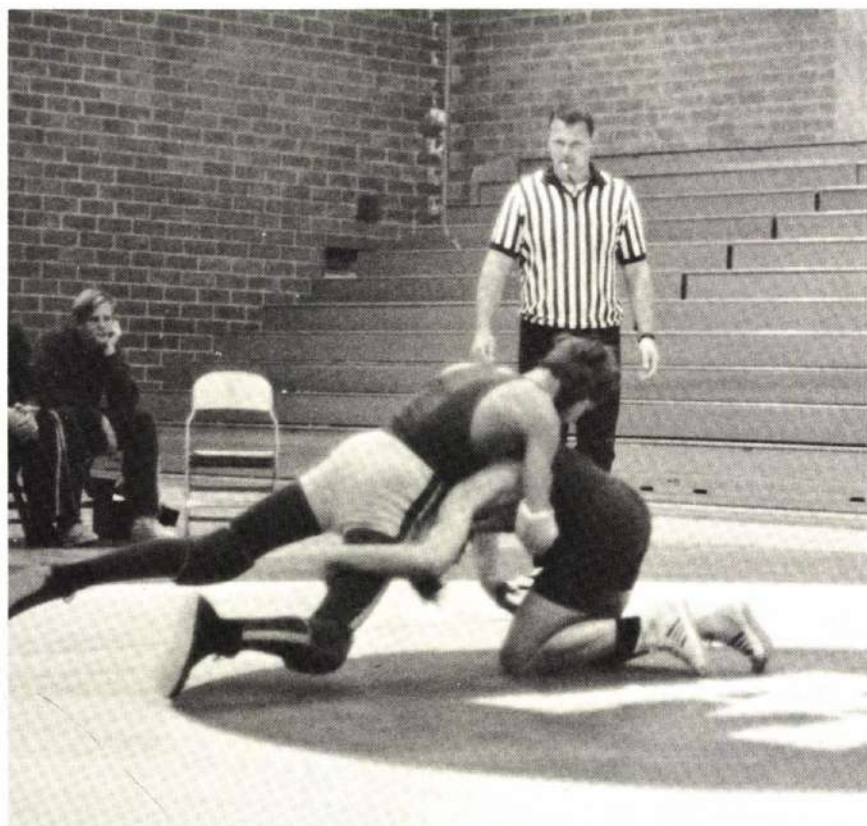

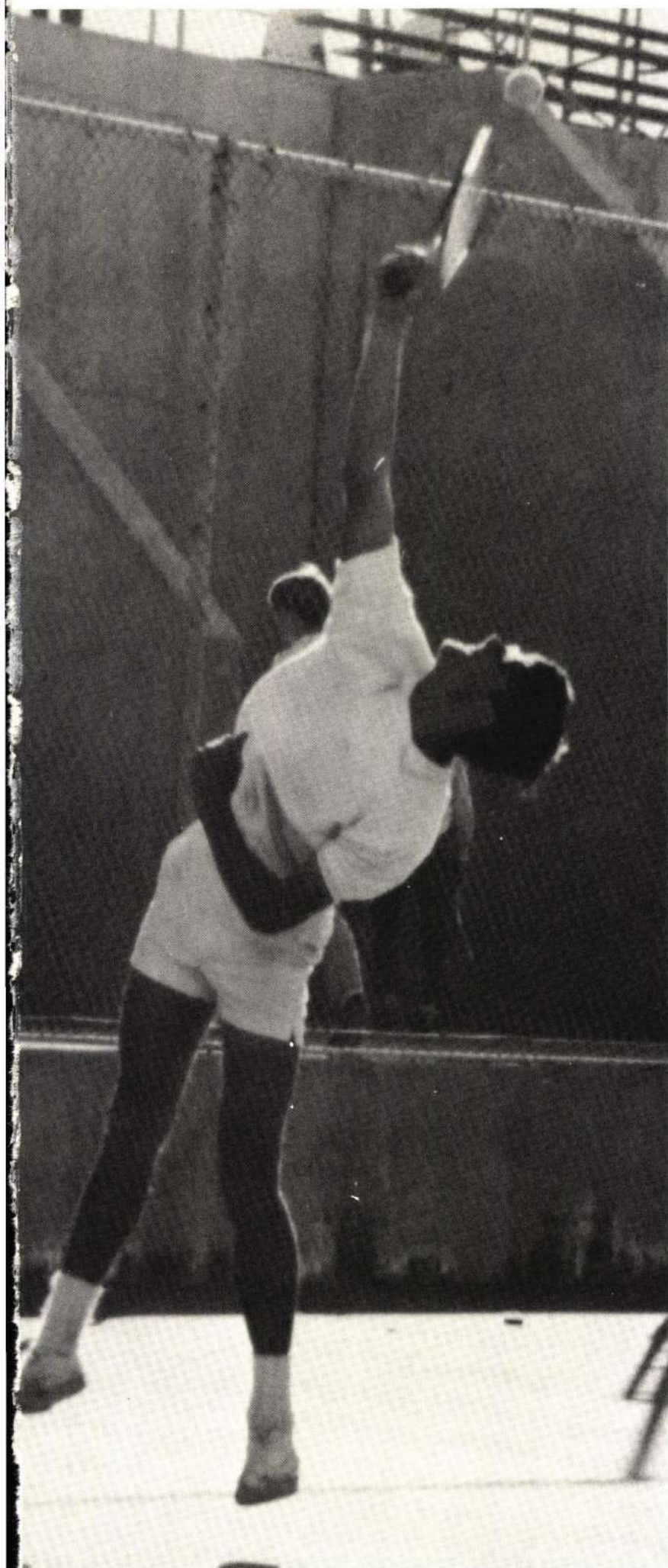


Marauder netters 1st in league

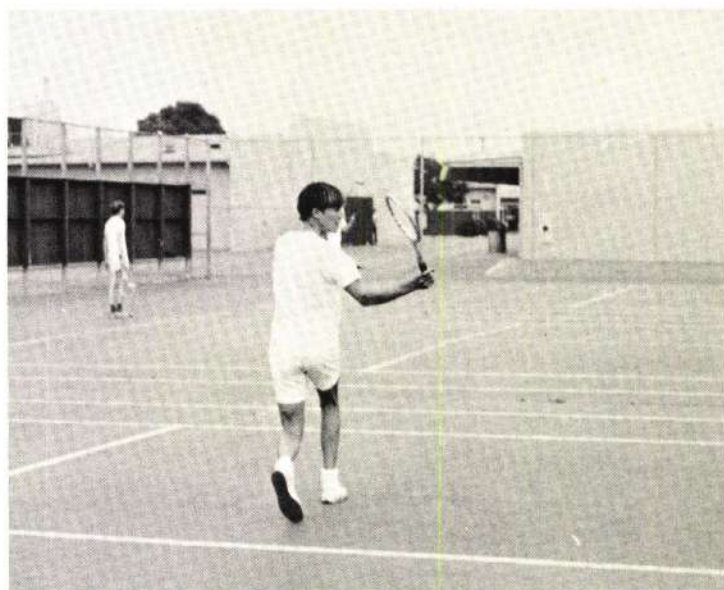


TOM SCHARFFENBERGER drives a backhand shot into the opposing doubles at Lennox High School, Miraleste's first league match of the season.

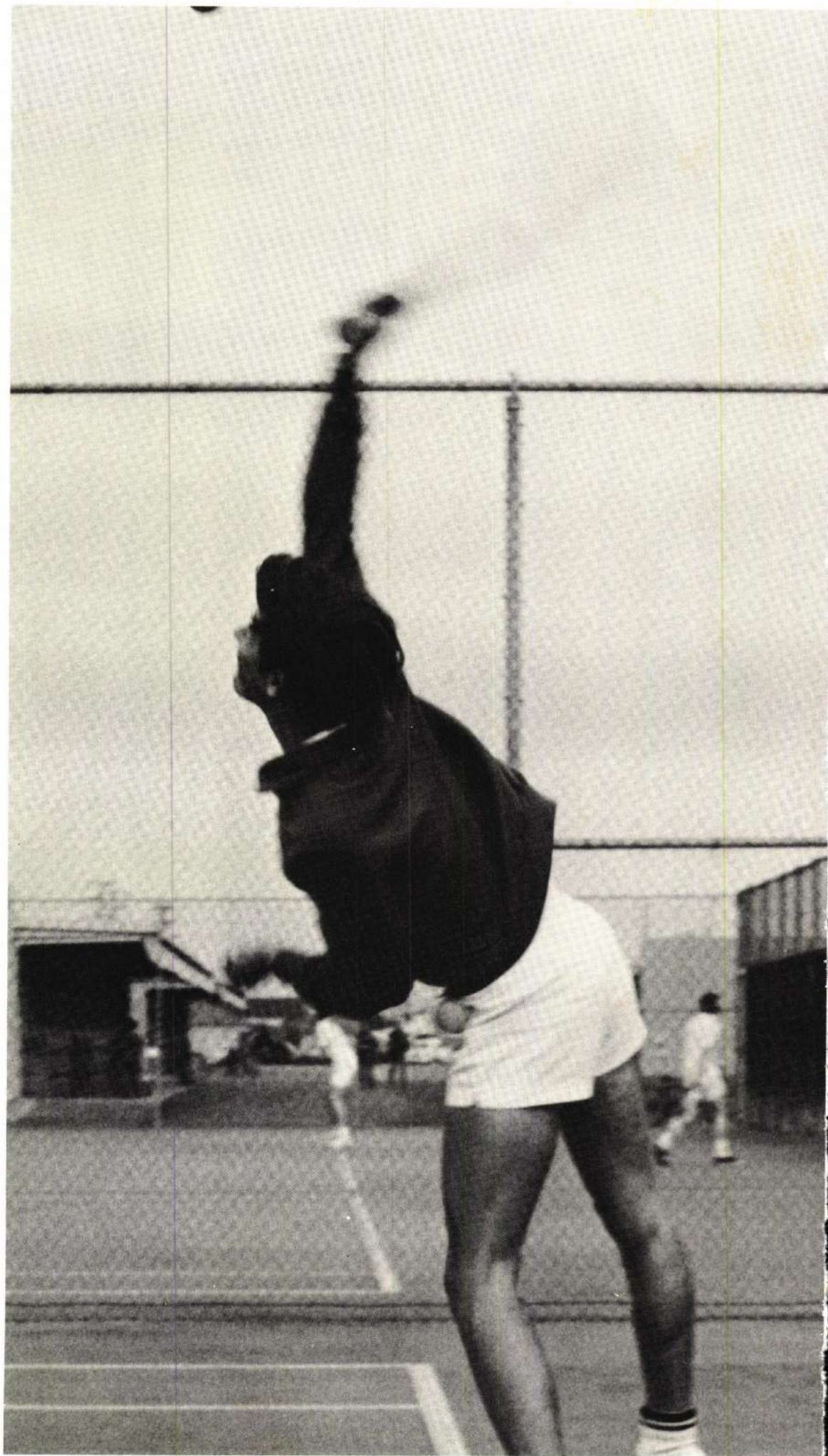


RAND EVETT WINDS up to unleash one of his vicious serves against Rolling Hills. Rand was first man varsity because of his lightning fast returns and bullet serves.

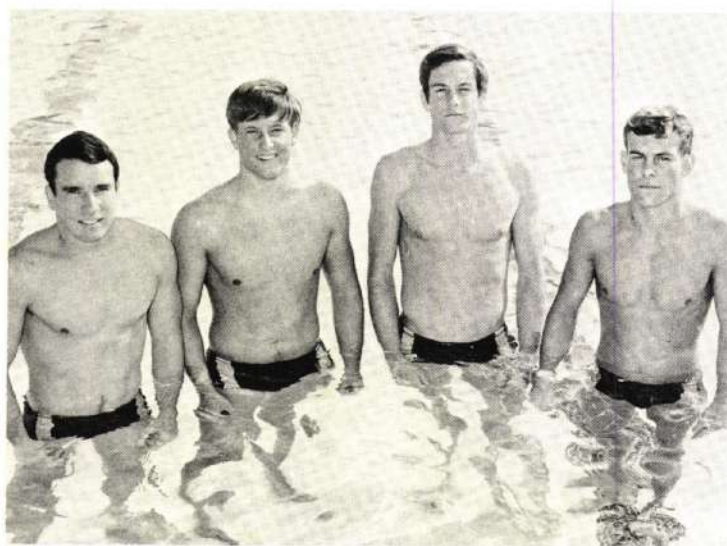

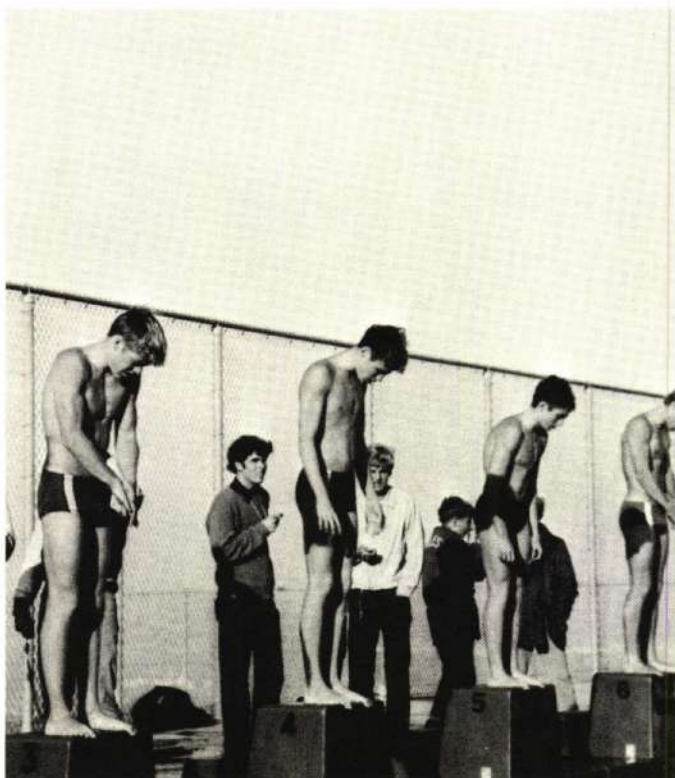

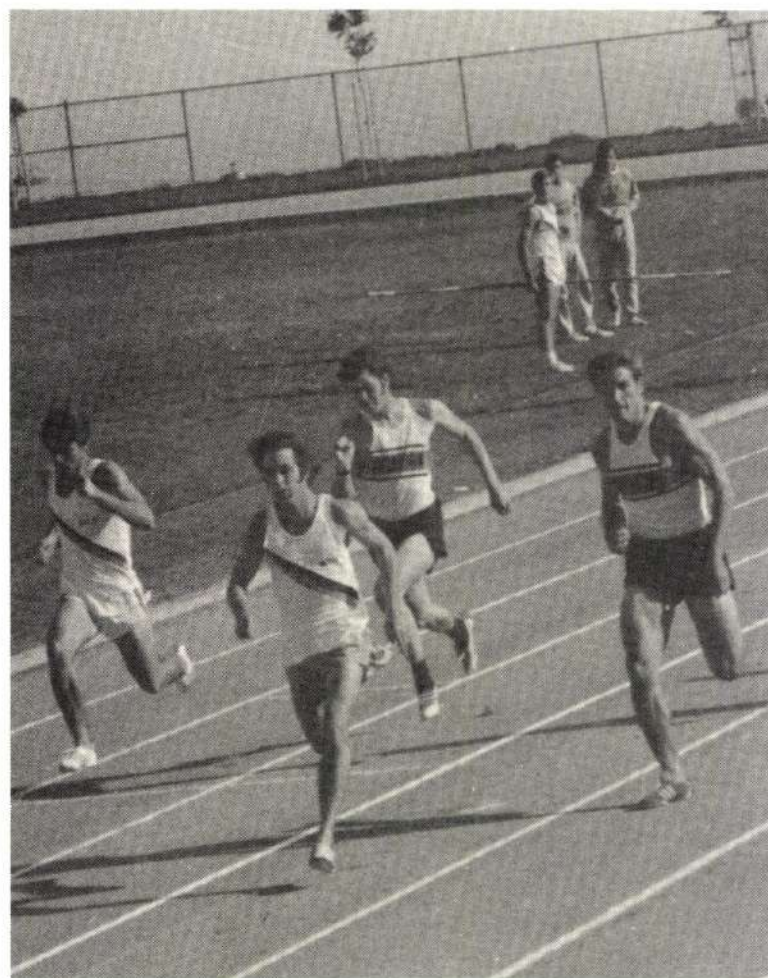

Bees set fast pace

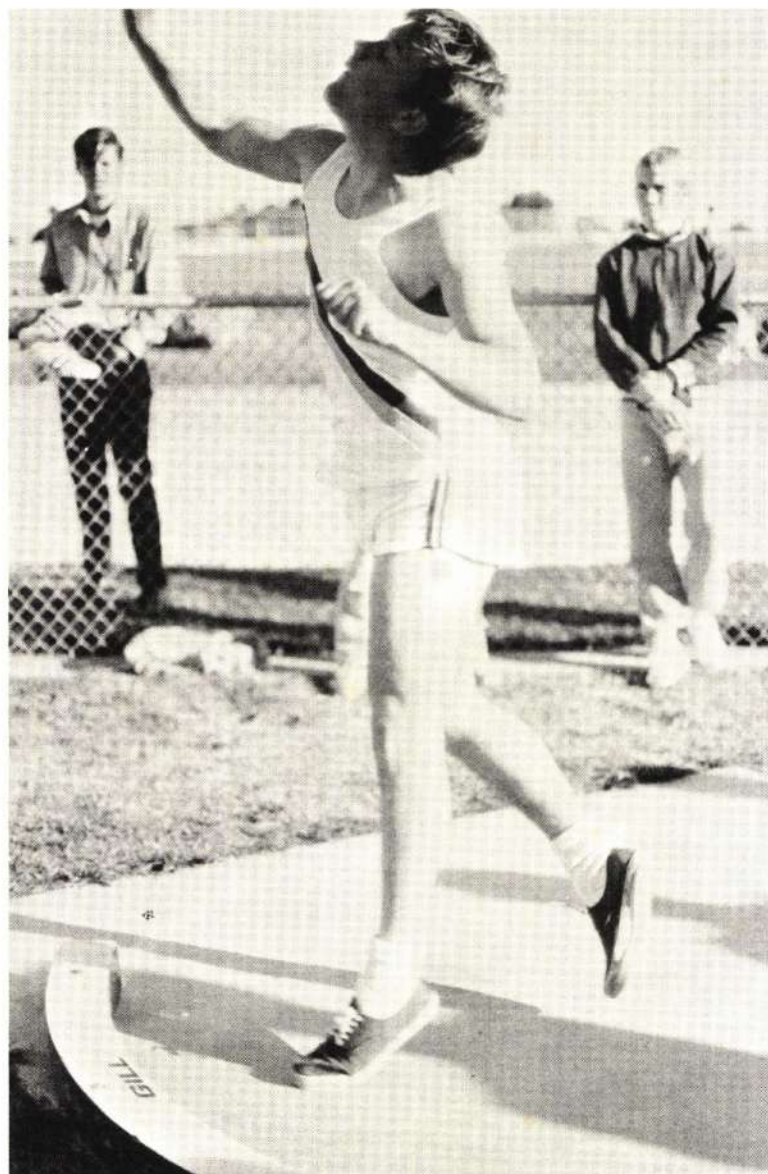

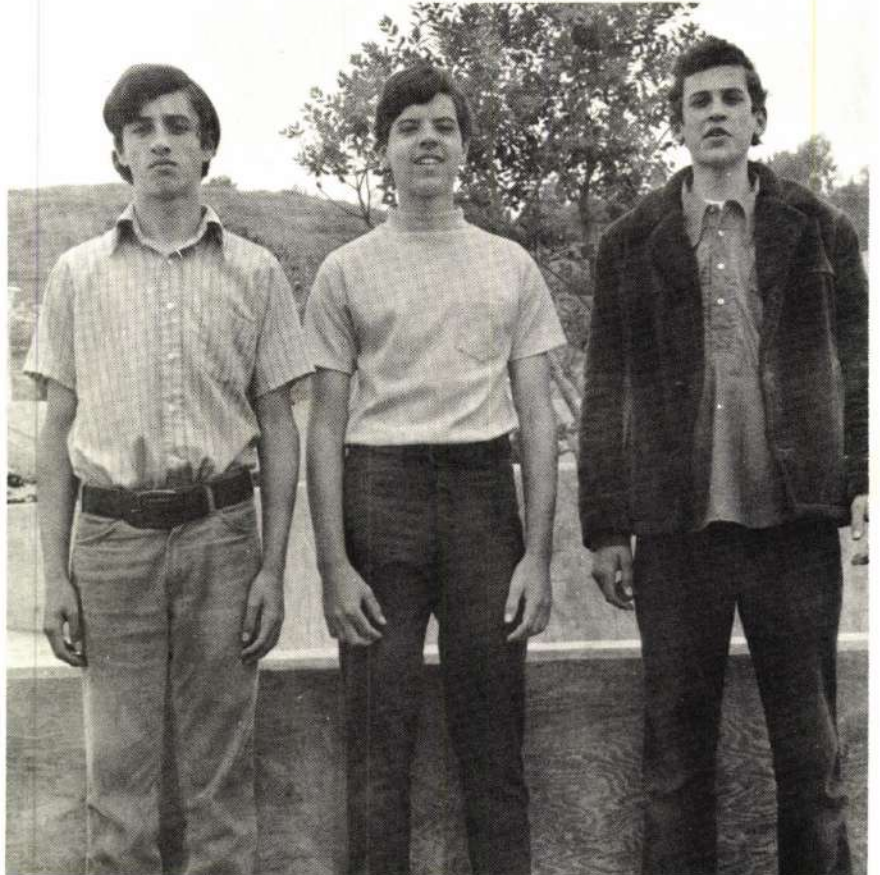

The Junior Varsity team, consisting of six golfers, have improved considerably since last year. They will be coming back next year to carry on the work of the Varsity team.

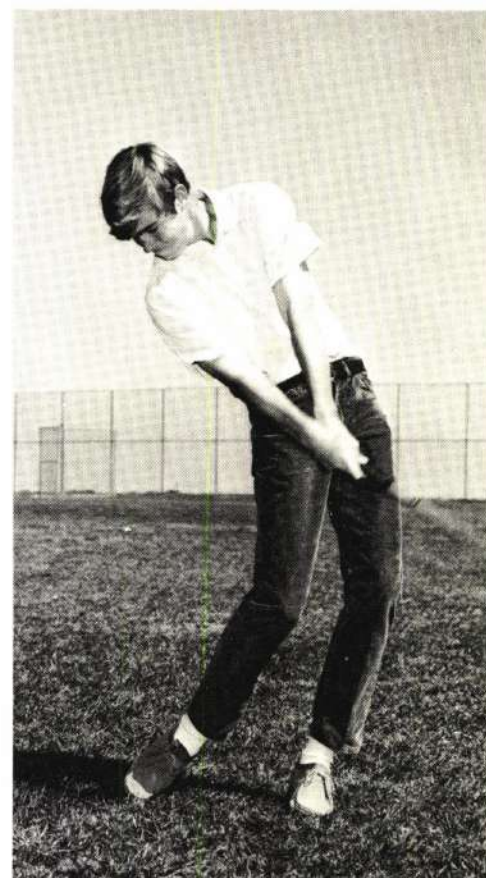


VARSITY GOLF Row 1: Wallace Scott, Wade Ramey. Row 2: Bob Segal, Bob Weaver, Larry Nivens.

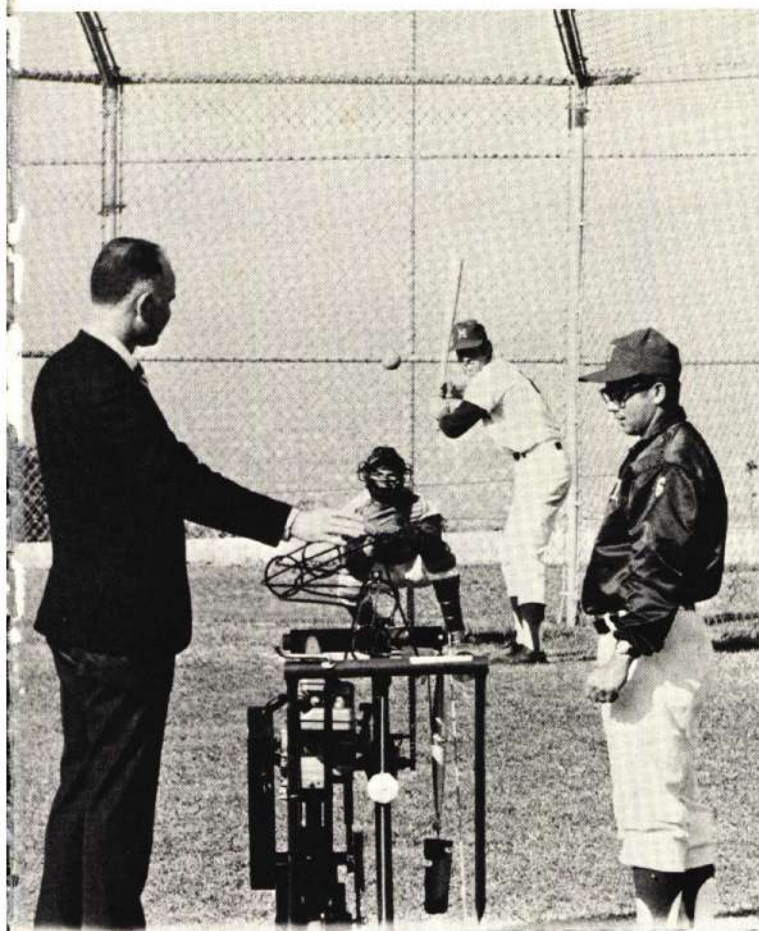

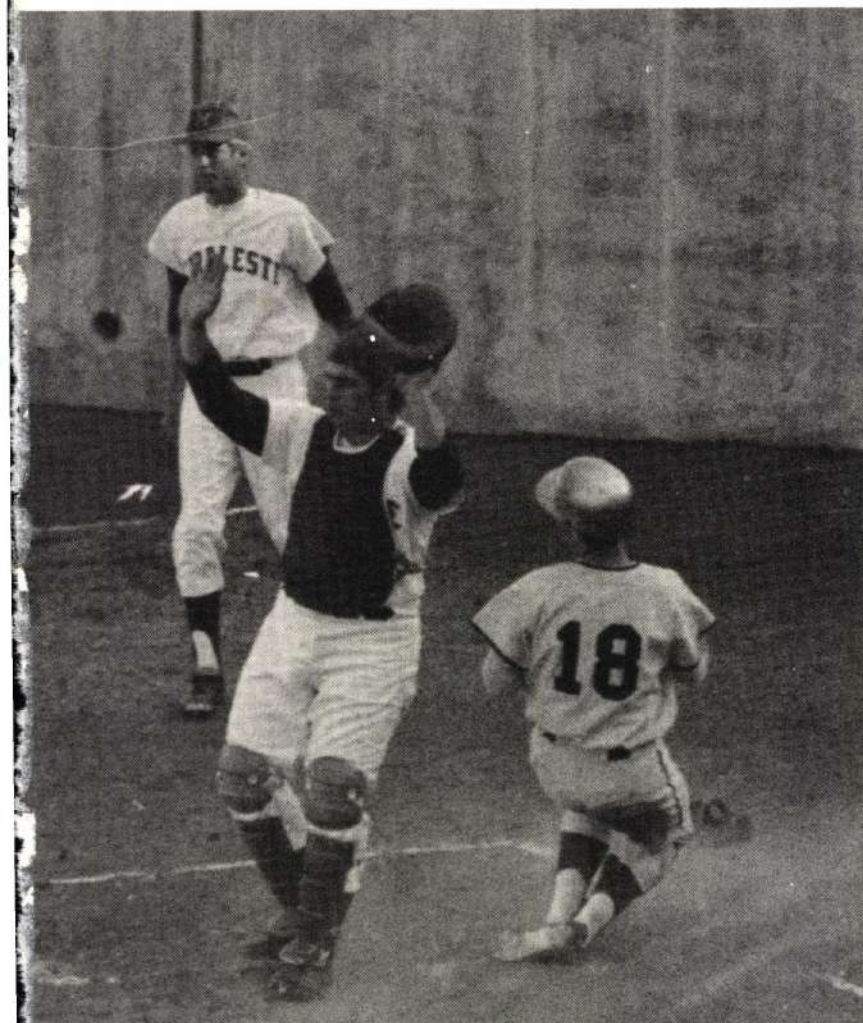


Pitching machine promotes skills
