Effective decision-making is essential in games; at every "move" the player must make decisions to face the unknown and upcoming properly.



WORLD

Riots erupted in England's industrial areas, resulting in burning and looting that was Britain's worst civil disorder in a century. The battles plotted racist "skinheads" against Indians and Pakistanis, have nots against haves, and everyone against the police. Causes of the riots were bigotry, poverty, boredom, and anger over rising unemployment and Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher's conservative policies.

Leaders from the Western World met in Ottawa for a summit to discuss their policies to make their countries stronger through more stable economies.

In a fairy tale come true, 32 yearold Prince Charles, heir to the British throne, was married to Lady Diana Spencer at St. Paul's Cathedral in London. The world-wide television audience was estimated at 750 million, but for most on the west coast, the T.V. replay was sufficient since the ceremony aired live here at 2 A.M.

NATION

Fifty years of government growth in America ended with the House passing Ronald Reagan's tax-cuts 238-195. The Democratic controlled House was persuaded to Reagan's plan by repeated calls and messages from people in their districts and the president himself. They were slated to begin on October 1.


Sandra Day O'Connor became the first woman appointed to the Supreme Court; she was promoted from the Arizona State Court of Appeals. Congress spent the two months deliberating her position. In the Supreme Court's 191 year history, 101 judges have served, and all have been men

STATE

The Mediterranean fruit fly, or medfly, multiplied to immense numbers in July; the problem could be most directly related to California Governor Edmund Brown's inert reactions to the problem. In December, 1980, tree stripping and ground spraying started in the Santa Clara Valley, and in the spring of 1981 the problem was thought to be under control. Sterile fruit flies were released for control, but later it was determined by the project director Jerry Scribner that they weren't totally sterile and actually contributed to the problem. Scribner and state authorities told local representatives that aerial spraying was to start on the 13th in Santa Clara County. Then governor "moombeam" rejected aerial spraying and ordered massive tree-stripping and ground spraying. The federal government stepped in, recognizing the idiocy of this plan and threatened a total quarantine of California

produce. Brown ordered the spraying and spent the night in the spray zone keeping the interests of the people at heart. The following day, Brown asked the president to declare an emergency in three counties where the problem was "beyond the control of state and local agencies." They didn't declare it, but instead pointed out that if small-scale spraying had been done earlier, billions of dollars in damaged crops, malathion, and labor hours would have been saved.

Signs like this one predominated Northern California this past summer. For sports fans, July was a long month. With baseball players on strike, negotiators Marvin Miller, Ray Grebey, and mediator Kenneth Moffitt became the boys of summer. The strike was fifty days old when settled on the 31st, forcing the cancellation of 713 games. The issue was that owners wanted compensation for free agents leaving their teams. Owners finally agreed to an earlier proposal of teams signing a free agent could protect 26 players, and the player's old team could choose among the remainders as compensation.


SPORTS

Wimbledon was an American sweep; Chris Evert defeated Hanna Mandlikova, and John McEnroe finally beat Bjorn Borg after Borg's five straight victories at the British tournament.

The summer of 1981 will not be remembered for a bumper crop of good films. Some favorites included James Bond's latest, "For Your Eyes Only" for which Rodger Moore received \$3 million. "Raider's Of The Lost Ark" was two hours packed with every action stunt imaginable. In "Tarzan the Ape Man" any last rumors of Bo Derek's ability to act were smothered.














Supremacy Survives



The sports seasons were especially excellent throughout this year with many teams qualifying for C.I.F. That made the pep squad's year more memorable.



The squad was especially successful in parade competitions. The members placed first in the Glendale parade and second in the San Pedro, Camarillo, and Artesia parades.



Two U.S. planes returned fire on, and shot down two Libyan aircraft off the north coast of Africa. The move was the result of U.S. planes being in water Libya claimed its own. However, the United States attempted to show Libvan President Kaddafi that it doesn't respect the borders he has set

In Tehran, bombs killed the Iranian president and prime minister, and the violence was blamed on who else but the United States. The scene in Iran now is one of chronic violence and rioting as the country is trying to determine which direction it will pursue.

For the first time in over three years, the price of gas dropped on a national average. With motorists trimming miles, a worldwide glut of oil emerged forcing prices down. Still, prices only fell an average of 6/10 of one per cent.

NATION

In early August, American air traffic controllers were preparing a walkout. Reagan issued an ultimatum against the illegal strike, telling them to return to work on Monday the 3rd.





Voyager 2 brought back valuable new information about the ringed planet Saturn.

They didn't and were promptly fired. Thousands lined up in cities to apply for the new openings; an entirely new staff needed to be trained. Meanwhile, retired controllers and military personnel filled the vacant positions in the towers.

Scientists in Pasadena followed the flight of Voyager 2 as it passed within 63,000 miles of Saturn. Launched in 1977, it was right on schedule, and although its cameras stuck and couldn't move laterally, it recorded valuable new information and pictures. Next stops for the unmanned craft are Uranis in 1986 and Neptune in 1989.


The medfly problem worsened. The pest appeared in the following counties within a week: southern Santa Clara, Alameda, Santa Cruz, and Stanislaus. Spraying began usually a week after detection, but when Japan asked the U.S. to restrict fruit shipments from California, spraying was done without delay. Helicopters were

dumping malathion hours after the fly was discovered in the San Benito County. On the 25th the fly appeared in Southern California. After the flies caught in Baldwin Park traps were positively identified, spraying began in Los Angeles County. The problem of spreading was blamed on drivers, and new inspection stations were set up for freeway travelers in Northern

California. State legislature asked the Supreme Court to block Georgia's attempted quarantine, and it went to the Federal Court to fight Texas' efforts to embargo the sprayed produce. A field poll indicated Governor Brown at the lowest point of public esteem in his political career.

SPORTS

Baseball resumed on the 9th with the all star game which the national league won 5.4 in Cleveland. Baseball owners decided on a split-season format which put first place teams from before the strike in the play-offs and everyone else starting from scratch in the remaining games. There was no incentive for first half champions (Dodgers, Phillies, A's, Yankees) because in winning both halves a play-off would be scheduled

with each division's second place teams from both halves. That created a complication where some teams would have to lose to secure a play-off spot. The schedule was revised again making only second half second place teams eligible. Fans found this a bit much to swallow. and second half attendance was down. In a Los Angeles court, the jury was hung, thus delivered no verdict on the Oakland Raiders proposed move to L.A. N.F.L. commissioner Pete Rozelle rejected Raider owner Al Davis' proposal of an 8-2 verdict, which would have put the Raiders in the L.A. Coliseum in 1982.



Local hero and rookie sensation Fernando Valenzuela led the sinking Dodgers with a rookie-record 8 shutouts.


ENTERTAINMENT

EXECUTIVE COUNCIL MAKES IT HAPPEN




NATION

In a critical economic decision, President Reagan elected to cut his original defense budget in an effort to balance the national budget. He did agree to begin building the controversial MX missile, but on a scaled down budget.

The second flight of the space shuttle was delayed from its original September 30th date. When gas leaked during tests one day, several of the protective-heat chips were destroyed, pushing the date back.

260,000 people paraded throughout Washington, D.C., protesting the President's economic policy. It was one of the largest political demonstrations in the history of the United States and it did prompt a television speech, but no policy was changed.





STATE

Over 1500 people were arrested in protests over licensing the nuclear power plant at Diablo Canyon, just outside San Luis Obispo. The protestors claim the reactor was built too close to an earthquake fault; however, the Nuclear Regulatory Commission felt otherwise, and the license was granted. Among those arrested were actor Robert Blake and singer Jackson Browne.

Only one new county was subjected to Medfly spraying — Contra-Costa. Experts anticipated the fly to be extinct in California by the end of the summer of 1982. September's Medfly problem was compounded by the unwillingness of the Japanese to

buy fruit from the state. Then, when small-quantity exporting was to start, the teamsters refused to load the shipments on boats, due to an additional fumigation chemical which was sprayed on the picked fruit.

Los Angeles celebrated its bicentennial on the 4th, climaxing a year of cultural events around the city. In time for the celebration was an earthquake, registered at 5.6, which jarred the Southland on the same day.

SPORTS

In a 14th-round TKO, Sugar Ray Leonard became the undisputed welter-weight champion, defeating Thomas "Hitman" Hearns. The cable and closed-circuit audience was estimated at three million.


The Dodgers coasted to a .500 finish and fourth place in the National League West division for the second half. One high point was Fernando Valenzuela's rookie-record: eight shutouts in a season which was 59 games shorter than the other record-holders. Also, Houston pitching ace Nolan Ryan threw his record fifth no-hitter. It was against the Dodgers.

After starting the season at 0-2, the Rams signed former Oakland quarter-back Dan Pastorini, creating yet another L.A. quarterback controversy. After the signing, starting quarterback Pat Haden led the Rams to 2-2. Longtime Rams defensive end Fred Dryer was cut despite a no-cut clause in his contract. He returned after Coach Ray Malavasi learned of the clause, but was cut for good later in the month.

John McEnroe won his third straight U.S. Open men's title in New York, while local favorite Tracy Austin took her second woman's title.

Featured Los Angeles performances during September were The Pretenders, Marshall Tucker Band, ELO, Kenny Rogers, Christopher Cross, The Allman Brothers, and the Little River Band.

The new fall television season began its eleven-week premier with NBC exploring alternatives to drugs through "Get High on Yourself" week. However, CBS' "60 Minutes" still reigned as rating's king.

AROUND CAMPUS/LOCAL

Registration day on the 8th started the school year, and schedules were delayed due to a computer breakdown. On the morning of the 9th, 140 students boarded buses for Running Springs and Leadership Camp '81. On the Friday they returned, the varsity football squad had its first game — a 27-7 romp at Mira Costa.

Classes started on the 15th as students discovered that twelve minutes had been added to the school day (two minutes extra per class) to comply with state requirements.


Our ability to exhibit effective and new leadership proved that the Class of '82 were "doers" and not "lookers". During our senior year, we've reached

WORLD

Early on the morning of the 6th, news reached the United States of the assassination of Egyptian President Anwar Sadat. He and seven others were gunned down while watching a military parade in Cairo. As the first Mid-East leader to seek peace with Israel in the seventies, he was considered a traitor by most of the other Arab nations. Millions joined his funeral while the new leaders pledged to follow his path.

Labor unrest continued in Poland, with strikes constantly being called forcing factories to shut down. The independent labor union Solidarity, led by Lech Walsea, forsaw major unrest coming in the months ahead. Working conditions were not improving and salaries didn't keep up with food prices which were tripling annu-

NATION

It was round two for Reagan and his massive victories in Congress. Three months after passing his tax cut, Congress O.K.'ed the 8.5 billion dollar sale of AWACS radar planes to Saudi Arabia. The move represented the largest sale of military equipment in the country's history, and Reagan "won" by employing many of the same tactics he used last summer. At the same time, he further reduced the MX missile program due to budget problems.

On a lighter note, French president Francis Mitterrand and President Reagan gathered in Yorktown to celebrate the 200 year anniversary of the final battle of the Revolutionary War.

NATION

Good news came at the beginning of the month from the city council,

which had secured the final sponsor for the 1984 Olympic facilities. As a result, no taxpayers' dollars would have to be spent on the event. However, another word came three weeks later saying that probably wouldn't be the case with security costs expected to at least double in the next three years.

SPORTS

The Dodgers won the World Championship, bringing the trophy back to L.A. for the first time since 1965. The team won three come-from-behind series victories in the post-season play. Down 2-0 to Houston, they rallied and swept the weekend games here. Then, against Montreal they fell behind 2-1 and again rallied to win the National League pennant on Rick Minday's solo home run in the ninth inning of game five. But the sweetest victory for L.A. fans was against the New York Yankees, whom they had lost to in '77 and '78. Again down 2-0, the team rallied and swept an exciting weekend series at Dodger Stadium. The champagne flowed with their 9-2 victory in New York on Tuesday the 28th. Yankee owner George Stienbrenner couldn't boast enough when up 2-0, but was so frustrated after the weekend in L.A. that he broke his hand in a fight he provoked in his hotel here. On Friday the 30th, 80,000 people jammed along a downtown parade route and in front of city hall where players gave speeches. Later, Fernando Valenzuela, the local hero, was awarded Rookie of the Year (the third year in a row a Dodger has won) and the National League Cy Young Award. He was the youngest player at 22 to receive it, and the first rookie ever to win it.

Hockey started with new divisions realigned by geography to cut down on travel. The Kings fell to fourth place.

The Rams climbed to their customary position atop the NFC West before again falling to 500 behind Pat Haden.

ENTERTAINMENT

95,000 fans packed the Coliseum for two days to see Mick Jagger and the Rolling Stones deliver their best U.S. tour in years. The group filled stadiums throughout the country, and Jagger was given excellent reviews for bringing the Rolling Stones back to the top of rock for the third decade in a row.

The reunion of Simon and Garfunkle drew an estimated 500,000 people in New York's Central Park.

Other groups appearing in Los Angeles included Pat Benetar and the Go Go's. At the top of the pop charts were the Stones' "Start Me Up," "Arthur's Theme" from Christopher Cross, and the Little River Band with "Night Owls."

Laker star Magic Johnson, signed to a 25 year, \$25 million contract last summer expressed his discontent with head coach Paul Westhead, and Westhead was fired.


Pat Riley was named the new coach, and Magic's nickname became "tragic Johnson." After the firing however, the Lakers went 11-1 after a 1-4 start.






Football Thrashes League &

The Marauders Freshmen Basketball team went undefeated in the Pioneer League (8-0), and had a fantastic season record of 19-3.






Gymnasts Vault to Victory



WORLD

Freedom was extinguished in Poland as the nation became the hostage of its own army. Martial law was imposed and civil rights became almost non-existent as the army's one purpose was to keep the people in line. News reports reaching the west were smuggled out as Polish radio and television were tightly censored. Every private telephone was dead and the gas stations were closed to private cars. All flights into and within the country were cancelled. A 10:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m. curfew was in effect nightly.

50,000 people were arrested for either striking or resisting arrest. The first arrested were the leaders of Solidarity including its founder, Lech Walsea. The independent labor union was crushed although government officials claimed it was only suspended. Communist Party Chief Jaruzelski announced the country would be run by a 21 member "Junta," a "Military council for the National Salvation."

Public resentment of government grew from the action against the union, whose 10 million membership represents 20% of the Polish population. From the underground, strikes and sit-ins were still called. Military force was used to break them up. Reportedly, hundreds of workers were killed in these confrontations.

Some Polish authorities said Jaruzelski's military moves were provoked by pressure from the Soviet Union, and many Western officials agreed. The United States imposed economic sanctions in response to the Polish crisis.

STATE

At Diablo canyon September's protesting finally paid off, and the Nuclear Regulatory committee closed the plant indefinitely until it could be proved that it was well enough constructed to withstand a severe earthquake.

SPORTS

The Rams finished their worst season in 16 years with a 6·10 showing. Despite this poor record, owner Georgia Frontiere made no front office or

coaching changes. Playoff bound teams were Dallas, Philadelphia, N.Y. Giants, Tampa Bay, and San Francisco from the N.F.C., and Miami, Buffalo, N.Y. Jets, Cincinnati and San Diego in the N.F.C. Biggest disappointments were last year's champion Oakland, Atlanta and the L.A. "Shams."

The Lakers shot to the top of the west with a .750 winning percentage with the starting line-up of Jamaal Wilkes, Mitch Kupcheck, Kareem Abdul-Jabbar, Magic Johnson, and Norm Nixon. The latter three were all named to the West's All-Star team. The Kings named a new coach, Don Perry, after the team sank to the third worst record in the N.H.L. Wayne Gretzky, The Edmonton 22 year old wonder child broke the ancient goal of 40 goals in 40 games, with an incredible performance of 50 goals in 39 games.






GIRLS' LEAGUE








GIRLS' SERVICE





SCROC; WORK EXPERIENCE





WORLD

Martial Law was resisted passively in Poland; dock workers were loading and unloading the same goods over and over, auto workers made parts that wouldn't fit, etc. Underground operations told workers to work slowly and ask stupid questions. As a result, 78 detention camps were set up throughout the nation for those arrested for those actions. Posters reading "Help the forces of law and order, combat anarchy and lawlessness" were torn down. Martial Law was not lifted since the resistance had not ended. The government urged workers to renounce their association with Solidarity. All of its leaders were thrown in jail for crimes of illegally provoking riots and strikes. With U.S. sanctions in effect, the Polish government had an excuse to raise food prices further. In some cases the food rose 400% in order to slow demands. Polish leaders felt no public threat could occur over the prices since Martial Law was still in effect.

NATION

The country plummetted into a recession. Although the inflation rate was dropped to 8% from 16% a year ago, unemployment was up to 9% nationally. The Pacific Northwest was especially hard-hit where in some logging areas the jobless were up to

Polish people were not allowed to visit a sacred shrine on a national holiday because the government had fear of riots.

25%. Interest rates did not drop; the prime rate remained at 17%, so home and car sales stayed down. The American auto industry made fewer units in any January since 1949, and sales were down 39% from January '81. Reagan urged the country to stick with his economic plans estimating a stronger America when the recession ends. He unveiled his "New Federalism" plan at the State of the Union which called for more money and power to be turned over to the states. The goal was to have spending more carefully monitored.

Paul Lynde, the famous comedian and long-time center square on "Hollywood Squares" died of a heartattack. In musicals for most of the early part of his career, he expressed that the center square became an inescapable prison to him in his later years.

A cold front swept the nation. In Florida, billions were lost in citrus crops due to below-freezing weather.

Rescue workers set off in a rubber dinghy to search for survivors in an ice Potomac River. In Chicago the heat from sewers engulfed the city in orange clouds.

In the nation's capitol, an Air Florida 737 crashed into the Potomac River, killing 78. The flight was apparently slowed on takeoff as ice weighted down its wings.

STATE


Northern California was devastated by severe rain. 500 homes and businesses were destroyed by rains and mudslides. In some areas over a foot fell in less than 32 hours. Highway 101 in Marin County was made impassable by the mud, which forced the Golden Gate Bridge to close for only the third time since opening in 1937. Many commuters were stranded in the city for a week,

while others took the ferry boats across the bay. Over \$300 million was estimated to be damaged.

SPORTS

The Clemson Tigers were awarded a National College Football Championship after upsetting Nebraska in the Orange Bowl 22-15. Washington defeated surprise Big 10 champion lowa in the Rose Bowl, Texas dumped Alabama in the Cotton Bowl, Georgia defeated Pittsburgh in the Sugar Bowl, and in the Fiesta Bowl Penn. State whipped USC. College Football had 6 number one teams before Clemson finally stayed on top: Michigan, Notre Dame, USC, Texas, Penn State, and Pittsburgh.

In Memorium . . . Mrs. Joyce Baziw Miraleste High School Nurse Mrs. Joyce Baziw passed away on October 29, 1981, from cancer. Memorial services were held at Wayfare's Chapel on November 2, 1981. She will be remembered as a person of incredible strength. "She will be remembered not only for her kindness, generosity, and friendship, but also for her spirit of life. There was always a smile on her face, and she never complained. She had a special will to live, and was a very special woman," remarked Karen Darling on her death. A tree was planted near the portables in her name at the request of her husband.





WORLD

Poland remained under Martial-Law, and many of our European allies refused to cooperate in imposing sanctions against the Soviet Union. The U.S. went through with it anyway.

American's concern grew over our continued interest in El Salvador's civil war. The U.S. poured millions into the country to attempt to prevent the present Duarte Government from falling. The government has a dismal human rights record, but Secretary of State Haig felt that if Soviet-backed Cuba took control it would have a dominoe-effect in Central America. El Salvador has promised to redesign its constitution in April, which the U.S. felt would be a big step in further democratic rule. Congressmen hinted that Haig supported making troop commitments to the country. Press Secretary Larry Speakes answered the rumors, "The President has no intention to send troops anywhere . . . at the moment." Meanwhile, mandatory draft registration continued in the U.S.

NATION

The economy dominated domestic news. Reagan went on the road compaigning to get his 1983 budget passed. His proposed budget had a record \$91.5 billion deficit. The president met opposition throughout Washington, even Republicans were reluctant to vote for it. The country protested the cuts in social programs coupled with massive defense buildups (13.2% increaded annual spending). Still, experts predicted the country to slowly emerge from its recession with prices staying generally low afterwards.

Reagan told his critics to "put up or shut up," and asked them for better proposals. In actuality, his social cuts have really only slowed spending, not decreased it. Surveys showed that even after his cuts, spending has actually increased in Social Security, Medicare, Medicaid, and Food Stamps. Only in Aid to Needy Families with Dependant Children has spending significantly decreased.

Harvard University was the first to announce its 1982-83 tuition at over \$12,000. Several other Eastern universities followed suit. '82-'83 is the first year most private schools will have to refuse students on the basis of financial aid. Federal budget-cuts are the cause; student loans were cut 25%, so fewer people qualify.

The CBS Nightly News climbed back to the top in the competitive network news industry. Dan Rather, who replaced popular Walter Cronkite a year ago, attributed much of the new success to wearing a V-neck sweater for the broadcasts. "God knows what would happen if you put a ring in your nose," was his comment.

SPORTS

The Dodgers made off-season headlines by trading second baseman Davey Lopes to Oakland. Lopes was the starting second baseman for nine years, and by leaving he broke up the "inseparable infield" of Garvey, Lopes, Russell, and Cey. They had all

been the starters for a record nine straight years.

Fernando Valenzuela held out of spring training in a contract dispute. Valenzuela asked for a reported \$1.4 million a year; the Dodgers offered him \$350,000. Manager Tom Lasorda remarked, "The first thing Fernando wants is Texas back," but Valenzuela's agent Tony DeMarco corrected him, saying, "The first thing he wants is California back."

The Angels signed aging Yankee outfielder Reggie Jackson to a four year contract. He batted .216 in New York last year, and at 36 insisted he could still play. Season ticket sales at the Big A more than doubled three weeks after the signing.

Despite a mid-month slump, the Lakers remained atop their division with a 41-17 record at month's end. The Kings didn't fair as well. Coach Perry was suspended after he sent a player to the minor leagues because he wouldn't get involved in a fight. The team remained in fourth place.

WORLD

In 1972, a book was published titled The Jupiter Effect. It predicted all the planets in our solar system to be aligned in a straight line with earth being on the opposite side of the sun. Arco dealers expressed concern because most of their loyal customers said they would change companies instead of paying cash.

The space shuttle Colombia made its third journey into space on the 22nd. Only 128 days after its last journey, it represented the first time a craft had been re-used so rapidly. Early predictions were to have the craft take only 14 days between take-offs, but scientists now predict the earliest possible turn-around is 51 day.

A medical breakthrough enabled mothers who had Caesarean births to have normal births with future children. In other medical news, the United State's first test-tube baby had its one-year physical and was found in perfect condition.

The Lakers had another good month remaining in first place in the west. The Kings peaked at the end of the month, just in time for the playoffs. They qualified despite an overall record of almost 43 games under 500. Fernando Valenzuela held the original offer from the Dodgers of \$350,000. 
AROUND CAMPUS/LOCAL
