



Togetherness . . .



In-Between Time . . .








Bound Together With Spirit









United By Games

Lunchtime!













Shaping Our Future

WORLD

For three weeks troops from the Palestine Liberation Organization (PLO) had been occupying West Beirut. While negotiations for removing the PLO took place, Israeli forces launched the heaviest assault yet on the PLO since the occupation began. The assault included heavy shelling of downtown Beirut which caused much damage to the buildings and resulted in several hundred deaths.

Following the assassination of Lebanon's President-elect, Bashir Gemayel, the Israeli government sent armed forces into West Beirut. There, they entered the refugee camps of Sabra and Shatila and opened fire, killing hundreds in a bloody massacre.

Mexico suffered its worst economic crisis since 1910. As compared to the fiscal year of 1981, unemployment rose to 50% and inflation threatened to reach 100% by the end of the year. The rate of exchange on the Mexican peso increased to a staggering 200%.

The biggest buying spree in Wall Street history took place over a ten day period. Over 100 million shares were sold. The spree was spurred on by dramatically slowed inflation, falling interest rates, and Reagan's 98 billion dollar tax bill.



NATION

President Reagan persuaded Congress to pass a three year deficit-checking 99 billion dollar tax hike. The Senate approved a bill to curb illegal aliens from Mexico. The bill would hold employers accountable for hiring "undocumented" workers. Also, the bill provided amnesty for the 6 million or so illegal aliens already here. However, for those trying to enter the United States through legal action, the bill will

make it harder for them to do so.


President Reagan vetoed a 14.2 billion dollar supplemental spending bill that would have provided additional money for the 1982 fiscal programs.

Space Services, Inc. of America launched the first "free enterprise" missile, the Conestoga I, from Texas.

The national cost of living rose a slight 0.3% as inflation was restrained by de-



creasing gas and food prices. Economists viewed this improvement as a sign of progress in combatting inflation. A jump in the number of unemployment claims seemed to indicate that the unemployment rate might reach 10% by the end of the month.



ENTERTAINMENT

Apple computer wizard Stephen Wozniak sponsored what some people were calling "Woodstock II." The US Festival, held during the Labor Day weekend, was the biggest outdoor concert since Woodstock in the late 60's. The event, held in Glenn Helen Regional Park, drew crowds of more than 200,000 people. Some of the performers featured were the Talking Heads, the Police, Oingo Boingo, the Cars, the Grateful Dead, Jackson Browne, Pat Benetar, Fleetwood Mac, and Tom Petty and the Heartbreakers. Those who attended the festival praised the organization, complained about the scorching temperatures, and rocked to the music. The party atmosphere was prevalent, and most hoped for another in the future.

Three of Hollywood's most beloved and talented performers passed away. Henry Fonda died at the age of seventyseven, soon after he received his first Academy Award for his role in the film On Golden Pond. Princess Grace, formerly Grace Kelly, died at fifty-two. She was remembered most for her "class and poise" and her "fairy-tale" marriage to Prince Ranier of Monaco, as well as her Academy Award winning performance in Country Girl. The movie industry also lost the talents of actress Ingrid Bergman who died of cancer. The two time Oscar winner received audience and critics' approval for the roles in films such as Notorious, Anastasia, and For Whom the Bell Tolls. Her final triumph was the limited television series A Woman Called Golda, which she made while extremely ill. She won an Emmy award for Best Actress in a Limited Series, providing the emotional highpoint at the ceremony. Hollywood lost a trio of truly great performers who can never be replaced.

At the movie theaters some of the box office hits were An Officer and A Gentleman, Friday the 13th III in 3-D, Summer Lovers, E.T., Poltergeist, and Pink Floyd's The Wall.

Three of the biggest selling albums were Asia's Asia, Fleetwood Mac's Mirage, and Stray Cats' Built for Speed.

SPORTS

The baseball season continued to wind down with players looking toward the play-offs, and with every game becoming more crucial.

A strike was called by the National Football League Players' Association against the game's owners. Two of the key issues that brought about the strike were salary disputes and the method of player payment. Starting September twenty-third, no games would be played until a settlement was reached.





Leaders Come Together


To kick off the year, the "leaders" of Miraleste traveled to Camp O-Ongo in Running Springs for three days of business and pleasure.

Unfortunately, the mischief got out of hand and a warning issued, but everyone agreed that it was one of the most productive and fun-filled sessions ever.























Classes Come Together





A Week of Spirit




















Sophs Choose Their Favorites







"No No Nanette"



WORLD

Leonid Brezhnev died at the age of 76 from heart disease after 18 years as the president of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics and General Secretary of the Communist party. His successor was 68 year old Yuri Andropov, the former head of the KGB.

The Polish government attempted to ban Solidarity by a law which formally abolished the independent trade union. The passage met with much defiance in the form of strikes and demonstrations.


The first of 1,200 U.S. Marines arrived in Lebanon to help keep the peace. The American forces, coupled with French and Italian troops, were sent to help maintain the Lebanese government in the ensuing aftermath of August's massacre in West Beirut.

Zenko Suzuki resigned as Prime Minister of Japan after 2¼ years. The two main reasons for his resignation were declining public support and growing discontent within his Liberal Democratic Party (L.D.P.). He was succeeded by Yasuhiro Nakasone, former head of the Defense Agency and president director general of the Administrative Management Agency.

The 1982 Nobel Peace Prize was awarded to Swedish sociologist Alva Myrdal, age 80, and Alfonso Garcia Robles, age 71, a Mexican career diplomat. Both Myrdal and Robles were antinuclear advocates.



October/November



NATION

Seven people died after taking Extra Strength Tylenol capsules laced with lethal doses of cyanide. These deaths caused a nationwide consumer alert: there were calls for tamperproof packaging of drugs, Johnson-Johnson stopped producing the capsules which were the nation's number one pain killer and they also urged druggists to remove the capsules from the shelves.

In the November elections the Democrats strengthened their grip on the House of Representatives by gaining 26 seats, shattering Reagan's union. They also picked up 7 governorships but were checked by the G.O.P. in the Senate races.

American farmers had experienced the worst fiscal year since the Depression. Three straight years of bumper crops had created enormous surpluses of major crops which were priced lower than they had been in at least a decade. The year's expected harvests of corn, wheat and soybeans were the largest in history, but the U.S. farm income was the smallest since 1933.

Twenty-six thousand members of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers walked off their jobs due to salary disputes. The threat of a crippled economy forced Reagan to introduce emergency legislation to Congress ordering the engineers to accept a new contract and report back to work. The House and Senate overwhelmingly approved the bill and the engineers were back to work within four days.

Eight Republicans and seven Democrats from the National Commission on Social Security Reform met in Washington and agreed that \$150 to \$200 billion was needed over the next seven years for future benefit payments between 1983 and 1989.

SPORTS

The California Angels won the American League title by a narrow margin over the Kansas City Royals. However, after winning their first two games against Milwaukee in the best-of-five American League pennant series, they lost the next three games knocking them out of the World Series race. Meanwhile, the St. Louis Cardinals, the National League East winners, easily handled the Atlanta Braves, winners of the National League West title. In 1982, therefore, the World Series brought two teams together whom no one expected to be there: St. Louis and Milwaukee. It was St. Louis winning the title in seven games.

After 52 days without football, much to the disappointment of husbands across the nation, the N.F.L. Players Association and the teams' owners finally agreed to a settlement calling an end to the football strike.


Alberto Salazar, in the closest finish in the race's history, nudged out Ro-

dolfo Gomez of Mexico to win his third consecutive New York City Marathon. Meanwhile the winner for the women was Norway's Grete Waitz with a time of 2:27:14.

The annual crosstown rivalry between USC and UCLA heated up again to produce a football game which, as in the past, came down to the final seconds. With time having run out on the clock, USC had just scored making the score 19-20 in favor of UCLA. USC decided to go for the two-point conversion and consequently, the win. However, USC's quarterback was sacked, giving the Bruins the victory.

ENTERTAINMENT

The latest movies in the continuing James Bond series were scheduled to start shooting in the summer of 1983. However, the leading role of agent 007 will be portrayed by two different actors. Sean Connery will have the starring role in Never Say Never Again, a role which he created




20 years ago in Dr. No and hasn't portrayed since Diamonds Are Forever. Roger Moore will be playing Band which he has portrayed six previous times, in the other movie, Octopussy.

In a press conference in L.A., former husband and wife Elizabeth Taylor, 50, and Richard Burton, 56, announced their starring roles as the "bright but bitter lovers" in Noel Coward's 1930 comedy "Private Lives."

Following a press conference in New York City, Roger Daultry, the lead singer of the Who, announced the band's farewell American tour. The date for their Los Angeles engagement was October 29 at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum. Close to 95,000 came to the concert with the warm-up bands T-Bone Burnett and the Clash kicking off the festivities.





A month after the incident, the inquiry into the Israel massacre continued. Investigators have cleared Major Saad Haddad, the head of the "Army of Free Lebanon" — Israel's chief ally in the southern part of the country.

Newly appointed secretary of State, George P. Schultz, met with other NATO foreign ministers in Brussels. Schultz joined the allies in reaffirming their commitment to deploy 572 medium-range missiles in Europe if U.S.-Soviet talks fail to be more receptive to an offer of warmer relations from the U.S.S.R.

South African commandos hit Maseru, the capital of Lesotho, with a barrage of rockets and machine-gun bursts. Their mission was to destroy strongholds of the African National Congress (ANC), a black-liberation organization, and kill as many rebels as possible. Within six hours, six houses were in smoking ruins and the streets were littered with at least forty dead and scores of wounded.

Yuri Andropov, amid the Soviet Union's sixtieth anniversary celebration,

announced that Moscow is ready to cut its European nuclear arsenal by "hundreds of rockets," including many of the modern SS-20's. He also offered to trim down the Soviet force to equal the 162 missiles fielded by Britain and France and stated that the Kremlin would match any further British and French cut-backs. The Soviet arms control package looked attractive at first. but it was discovered that Andropov hadn't actually agreed to destroy any of the missiles pulled out of Europe and those that remained were much more powerful than Western models. Therefore it proved Andropov's principle aim was to upset NATO's plans to modernize its nuclear defenses.

In the Beirut suburb of Khalde, negotiators from Israel and Lebanon, as well as U.S. mediators, met face-to-face for their first formal peace talks in more than three decades. The three parties agreed on a triangular table, however, the principles staked out widely divergent positions on virtually every matter discussed.

In a major blow to Ronald Reagan's proposed 1.6 trillion dollar defense build-up, the House refused to approve funds for the controversial MX missile. That was the clearest signal, as of then, that the consensus on defense needs was eroding in the face of an enormous federal budget deficit.

What was to have been the first march on the Nation's Capitol since 1925 by forty KKK members never emerged. A crowd of 3,000 anti-Klan protestors lined the scheduled route and the police decided to cancel the rally. Thwarted in their attempt to attack the Klansmen, anti-Klan demonstrators charged police lines in Lafayette Park across from the White House. Rock-throwing and tear-gas-tossing ensued. Windows were smashed, cars were overturned. and a bicycle shop was looted. When the assault ceased, ten police had been injured and there had been thirty eight arrests.

Leon Jaworski, the Watergate prosecutor who persuaded the Supreme Court to force Nixon to release sixty four White House tapes, died at the age of 77 of a heart attack.

The biggest cash heist in U.S. history took place from the Sentry Armored Courier Corporation in the Bronx, New York. The amount taken was 9.8 million dollars from thirty million dollars in receipts from a local race track, several area banks and a variety of local businesses.

The twelve year old USS New Jersey, a 58,000 ton World War II battleship, and a 30 year old B-52 strategic bomber were the newest vehicles of one of the military's newest, most sophisticated weapon system — the cruise missile. A squadron of 16 B-52s at Griffes Air Force Base in Rome, New York, and the New Jersey, which President Reagan recommissioned himself in Long Beach Harbor, have been refitted with the launchers for the new missiles. Over the next decade the Defense Department plans to spend an estimated 1.8 billion dollars to put 8,458 cruise missiles on the ground in Europe, in the air on B-52s and B-1 bombers, and ships such as the New Jersey.

In Overtown, Florida, some two hundred protestors raged through the streets setting cars ablaze, hurling rocks and bottles, and looting stores. The incident, which lasted three days, was apparently caused by the shooting death of twenty year old Nevell Johnson Jr. under disputed circumstances by officer Luis Alvarez, 32.


The Fueras Armadas de Liberación Nacional Puertorriqueña (FALN), who since 1974 were linked to about one hundred incidents of terrorism in the U.S., committed their most daring attack on government authority. They were the cause of four simultaneous blasts that rocked federal and city office buildings in New York City.

SPORTS

With the end of the year came the end of the professional and college football season. The NCAA season came to a climactic end with the national championship being decided in the Sugar Bowl. Penn State beat Georgia 27-23 giving them and their coach, Joe Paterno, their first national championship. Other games included SMU's defeat of Pittsburgh, 7-3, in the Cotton Bowl, UCLA's victory in The Rose Bowl against Michigan, 24-14, and Nebraska's win over LSU in the Orange Bowl, 21-20.

In the professional rankings, the Washington Redskins, after a defensive battle against Minnesota and an upset victory over Dallas, beat the Miami Dolphins in the Super Bowl. The running of John Riggins, the game's most valuable player, proved instrumental in Washington's upset victory.

Several weeks after retiring from coaching college football, Alabama's former coach and the winningest coach in college football history, Bear Bryant, died of a heart-attack.


Men at Work, one of Australia's most popular groups, came to prominence in the United States as well. Their album "Business as Usual", has been number one on Billboard Magazine's Pop Music Chart for five weeks and their single, "Down Under", was number one for three weeks.

The 1982 movie industry had its biggest earnings ever. Ticket sales were at a high of nearly 1.2 billion dollars and estimates put the box-office grosses at 3.4 billion dollars. "E.T.," Steven Spielberg's hit movie, was the top grosser, earning 322 million dollars.

The most popular movie at this time was "Tootsie", featuring Dustin Hoffman in drag. People felt that Hoffman's portrayal brought a sensitivity and understanding to womanhood from a man's perspective. Other movies included "Ghandi" with Ben Kingsley in the title role and "48 Hours" with Eddie Murphy and Nick Nolte.

Arthur Rubinstein, one of the century's greatest pianists, died at the age of 95.


























Football Studs: What a Season!

The team played its toughest pre-season schedule ever, including South Torrance H.S. and Banning H.S. The Marauders finished their pre-season with a 3-2 record, showing a lot of promise for the regular season play with a physical, hard-hitting, defense, the team's greatest asset. The Marauders dropped a disappointing league opener to Redondo H.S., who went on to be league champions. 





V. Water Polo: Successful, Tough Season





With the return of the 11 juniors and six first year players, the team is looking forward to being competitive next year with the tough Ocean League schedule.






A Young Girls' Vars. Wins 4A C.I.F. — J.V. Finishes #1






JV Basketball Conquers League









Sophomores Tip It In




Freshmen Bounce Back






Girls Basketball Sinks 'Em












Boys' Tennis: No Faults


Baseball — A Grand Slam


J.V. and Frosh Baseball











Volleyball Rebuilds, Wins







Games Club







WORLD

In the aftermath of Israel's victory in Lebanon, Syrian President Hafez Assad indicated to U.S. special envoy Philip Habib that he favored an early withdrawal of all foreign forces from Lebanon. However, the Syrian Leader soon changed his mind and insisted that the Israelis leave first. Also Assad continued to build up his armed forces in the expectation of a new round of warfare with Israel in Lebanon.

In one of the left's biggest offensives, guerrillas in El Salvador hit targets around the country, including a lightning raid on the central Army barracks in San Salvador itself. Political developments reflected the turmoil on the ground. In a surprise vote, El Salvador's Constituent Assembly clipped the power of Assembly President Roberto D'Aubuisson, leader of the ultraright-wing Nationalist Republican Alliance (ARENA). The revolt in the Assembly opened the first major crack in the conversative political coalition that has dominated El Salvador since elections in March 1982.

Summary executions and guerrilla terror were

commonplace in the moutain valleys southeast of the Peruvian capital of Lima. Government forces were fighting a frustrating war with rebels belonging to Sendero Luminoso (Shining Path) — a strange communist splinter group. The battleground is one of the poorest regions of Peru. There the misery of the Indian peasants has gvien the guerrillas the recruits they needed to challenge the government of President Fernando Belaúnde Terry.

The Lagos government ordered up to two million people to flee Nigeria in the largest forced march in Africa's recent history. The outcasts were victims of a cruel economic theory. Its author, Nigeria's President Shehu Shagari, accused illegal immigrant workers of ruining his country's economy by taking needed jobs and draining the nation's wealth. He gave the foreign workers two weeks to clear out. The order sent immigrants rushing to the borders in panic.

In an unflinching report, an Israeli commission found Ariel Sharon, defense minister of Israel, guilty of "indirect responsibility" for the Beirut massacre.



During the ensueing debate, tempers flared and accusations mounted. In the end, Sharon agreed to step down as defense minister, but he said he would remain in the cabinet.

NATION

Thirty-foot waves, torrential rains, tornados, and mile-a-minute winds battered the California coast as a rapid-fire series of storms swept in from the sea. The toll was at least a dozen dead and nearly 100 million dollars in damage including the washout of a portion of the lefthand lane of Palos Verdes Drive East just behond Miraleste Plaza.

The Department of Health and Human Services published its final version of one of its most controversial initiatives ever. The newly proposed "squeal rule," backed by the Reagan Administration, would have required all federally funded family-planning clinics to notify the parents of "unemancipated" teen-agers under eighteen within ten days when they are given prescriptions for contraceptives. However, the main exception is when notification might cause the adolescent to suffer physical abuse at home.


Because of the strike called by the Independent Truckers Association (ITA), non-striking drivers were the subject of violent attacks along the nations highways. In total, more than one thousand acts of strike-related violence were reported in thirty six days as well as one man having been killed and fifty others injured.

Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Administrator Anne Gorsuch dismissed the EPA's administrator of hazardous waste programs, Rita Lavelle, bringing allegations against Gorsuch and the entire department to a peak. Six Congressional subcommittees then began investigations into the EPA's hazardous waste programs. Gorsuch herself was accused of perjury, conflict of interest, and political manipulation. Despite President Reagan's public backing, Gorsuch resigned on March 10. Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II embarked on a ten-day West Coast expedition of the United States. The visit was filled with elegance and ceremony including a receiving pary of three hundred private pleasure craft, yachts, and water-spouting fire boats for the royal vacht Britannia and a one hundred thousand dollar dinner given by the Reagans. However, the highlight of her trip was a visit to the Reagan Ranch in California.

ENTERTAINMENT

Due to the variations of rules from conference to conference in the NCAA, many teams and players who were considered to be down-and-out proved otherwise. Scott Simcik of Alabama in Birmingham was just an example. Most of the officiating confusion was put upon by the four different three-point zones and three different shot clocks that were used.

The United States Football League began its first season of play ever. The USFL, a new concept in football since games are played in the spring and early summer, will have competition for spectators with the NBA playoffs, the Stanley Cup, the Indy 500, and the Kentucky Derby. However, much attention was already attracted to the League since Herschel Walker signed a three-year, three point nine million dollar contract with the newly established New Jersey Generals making him the highest paid player in football history.

In basketball, the UCLA Bruins made it into the NCAA playoffs after finishing off their regular season with the best overall record in the PAC 10. On the professional level the Lakers were in first place of the Pacific Division of the NBA with Seattle close behind.










Never to Forget


