



















ARRIVING AT THE GOLD










OUR GOLDEN YEAR














The pride, spirit, and traditions of Miraleste High School have developed over the past fifteen years because of the many different people who have been a part of our school.


OUR GOLDEN GOALS



WORLD

1,2 <u>USSR</u> shot down Korean Air Lines 747 on Sept. 1 over Japanese waters when it had strayed over the "sacred" USSR land. All 269 passengers died — 30 of which were U.S. citizens, including 1 senator. Reagan denounced it as an act of barbarism and demanded that an apology and reparations be given. USSR responded to neither and claimed that the plane was on a spy mission.

<u>Lebanon</u> — To help establish authority after Isreal pulled back its troups, an American trained Lebanese army was permitted by Amin Gemayel. If order was not restored, a land/power grab was feared by Syria, Palestine, and Christian and Moslem forces.


Full scale civil war led to Reagan's authorization of the use of carrier based aircraft and navel gunfire at the discretion of the 1200 Marine Corps peacekeeping force. Before, gunfire was only permissible in self-defense.

3,4 <u>Israel</u> — Menachem Begin announced his resignation on August 6 after 6 years as Prime Minister. Foreign Minister Yitzhak Shimir was elected on Sept. 1. He will follow Begin's policies.

<u>Philippines</u> — Murder of Benigno Aquino, political foe of Pres. Ferdinand Marcos, took place at a Manila airport by an unidentified gunman. Suspicion was focused on Marcos, who had ruled for 18 years.

<u>Education</u> — Reagan, Congress, and citizens were pressuring schools in math, science, and English.

<u>U.S. Open</u> — Connors battled Lendel while suffering a foot injury. Martina Navratilova defeated Chris E. Loyd, last year's winner, to win her first U.S. Open.

Leadership Camp Leads The Way



On the Road to Gold



Band and Tall Flags Capture the Gold








All in all the 1983-84 school year was filled with many activities that brought the students together and hyped up Marauder spirit.









Safari Sweethearts



The Childhood Illusions of Story Theatre








I wish all of you good luck in whatever you do, keeping in mind that success comes from within. Thank you for your confidence and support. See you at the class reunions!





















<u>Lebanon</u> — Surprise bombings of U.S., French, and Israeli troops ended hopes for peace by support of Gemayel's government and negotiations for withdrawal of Israel and Syria. Lebanon is holding "national reconciliation" talks among oppsoing factions.


Syria — President Hafez Assad seeks to dominate Lebanon and eventually from a Syrian-led Arab World committed to the destruction of Israel. Syria is backed by over 7000 Soviet advisors.

<u>PLO</u> — Syrian backed radical Palestinian terrorists split from and demolished moderate forces under Yassir Arafat.

Grenada — Successful invasion on Oct. 25 by U.S. marines to protect American lives proved justified, after finding Cuban-based weapons and communications equipment. On Oct. 19, a marxist coup overthrew Maurice Bishop, Prime Minister since independence from Britain in 1974. Although the invasion was kept in secret, the marines were met with 1100 Soviet armed Cubans. U.S. casualties: 18 dead, 89 wounded. Complete withdrawal is delayed until the next election.

<u>Central America</u> — With over 5000 troops stationed in Honduras, U.S. warned the Cuban and Sandinista regime in Nicaragua that, if necessary, military force would be used to halt the spread of communism.

<u>Europe</u> — Despite the USSR walkout at the Geneva Arms talk and the strong antinuclear protest movements, W. Germany, Britain, and Italy reaffirmed commitment to receive the first deployment in Dec. of 572 Pershing 2 and Cruise missiles.





Asia — In a 6-day trip to Asia, Reagan sought to restore confidence in S. Korea after the airliner incident and terrorist bombing in Burma, which killed 17 officials, and to reassure them of our friendship and commitment to the defense against communism. In Japan, Reagan gently pressured them to boost defense spending, continue voluntary limit on auto exports, and open markets to U.S.






Girls' VB Digs In!




The Pace


Soph, Frosh B-Ball








Had a Trying Season



SOFTBALL 2nd to None





<u>ISRAEL</u> and U.S. have formed a stregic partnership in which U.S. increases military and economic aid and agrees to free trade.







The main function of our club this vear was to serve the school and community through various projects.


In addition, annual projects were: the blood mobile, homes tour, P.V. phone book delivery, and the Crhistmas project with Girls Service Club.




This year the Girls' Service Club was very active participating in service projects. ALICE DIEGO who was my




Theater Arts Club








Psychology Club

Bill Johnson and Phil and Steve Mahre captured golds in downhill skiing while Debbie Armstrong won the gold in the giant slalom. Kitty and Petter Carruthers won a silver in pair ice skating while Scott Hamilton and Rosalynn Summers took the gold and silver respectively. Jayne Torvil and Christopher Dean of Great Britain won the gold in pair ice skating with scores of six 5.9's and three 6.0's in technical merit and nine 6.0's in artistic performance. GARY HART vs. WALTER MONDALE — the race is on. As of March 16, all other candidates dropped out except for Jackson. Hart's surprise victory in the New Hampshire primary has boosted his campaign to challenge and even prevail over front runner Mondale. Hart's success consists of his youth (age 47) and his platform — "a new generation with new ideas" which is reminiscent of John F. Kennedy. Hart supports a nuclear freeze and an end to US aid to El Salvador. He opposes the MX missile and B-1 bomber while endorses buildup of conventional forces. (5)



WORLD

LEBANON — After devastating Moslem militia attacks on Lebanon in mid-February, Reagan decided to pull out the Marines to ships offshore. Their departure, within days, altered US role from participant to observer. For now, it's up to the Saudis, the Jordanians, the Syrians, and the Lebanese factions to sort things out. Although USSR would veto the measure, the possibility of a multinational UN peacekeeping force remains. (1,2)

USSR — After 15 months in office, Yuri Andropov died of kidney failure on February 9. Konstantin Chernenko was selected to take his place. At 72, Chernenko is the oldest man in Soviet history to take over the communist party. He faces a slowdown in economic growth, industrial backwardness, massive unchecked military spending, and a decline in agricultural production. (3)

IRAN — IRAQ, at war since 1980, caused a controversy concerning the use of mustard gas by Iraq, which has been under international ban since 1925, and Iran's threat to close the Strait of Hormuz, through which 1/6 of the free world's oil is shipped. Reagan opposed this measure, even threatening the use of naval force. (4)



WINTER OLYMPICS '84 in Sarajevo proved to exciting as well as suspenseful. Notable performers include Marja-Lusa (Finland) winning 3 golds in crosscountry skiing and a bronze in relay and Saetan Boucher (Canada) with 2 golds and 1 bronze and Karin Enke (E. Germ) with 2 golds and 2 silvers both competing in speed skating. US sent its best Olympic team ever; although





















Golden Memories Engraved in Time
