





Believe in Magic









Magical Moments

In January, the pep squad and student government members went on a magic ride during the Youth on Parade. These selected students represented the entire Miraleste student body.




MH Leaders Levitate to O-Ongo












Miraleste Homecoming.








Welcoming Back Magic


The Magic of Anne Frank




Class of '85




Forever
















The Class of 1987


Touched with magic, Martina was the recipient of the Dapplegray Vanguard Award for her overall performance in intermediate school.






Magic in the Water





Quicker Than the Eye




Caught in CIF's Spell






Varsity Soars in League Play




















Service and Fun...


Interact








Key Club


Girls' League




his year the Altruist Club was on campus, and was as strong as ever before. With Anthony Melendez as the club's president, the service club worked on many service projects throughout the entire year.


With a Final Wave


Finally, looking back at the freshman class of 1988, one can
